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Celebrating the Council for British Archaeology's Festival of British Archaeology 2012

Introduction

Building on the successful Festival of British Archaeology events at Carn Goch in 2010 and Carreg Cennen Castle in 2011 in Carmarthenshire, Dyfed Archaeological Trust was keen to showcase the best of Ceredigion's archaeology in Aberystwyth in 2012. The trust collaborated with Cynnal y Cardi, Ceredigion Museum and the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Wales to make the event possible.

This year's festival was based on the medieval history of the castle whilst also highlighting the Victorian and Edwardian seaside resort that Aberystwyth became.

Festival Objectives

In line with the objectives of the Festival of British Archaeology the objectives of the festival were to:

- Provide an accessible and alternative opportunity for people to experience their local heritage.
- To celebrate and showcase this "local heritage" as some of the best of British Archaeology.

• To provide an educational and entertaining event to increase an awareness and knowledge of local heritage.

- To encourage local people to experience and discover their local heritage.
- To attract a diverse audience.

In addition to this and as part of our funding agreement with Cynnal y Cardi, DAT additional objectives were

• Help to establish new networks between community groups and individuals with the organisations represented which will continue to be built upon in the future.

• Strengthen future partnerships between organisations through having developed new areas of joint working

• Provide information to members of the public on how to continue to access existing historic environment information resources which will help and encourage them to use these resources in the future

Provide an opportunity for members of the public to try out new skills

• Reach a diverse audience and enrich people's knowledge and experience of their historic environment.

Planning Stage

Working within a team Alice Pyper (AP), Menna Bell (MB) and Sarah Rees (SR)of the Dyfed Archaeological Trust were mainly responsible for the organisation of the festival along with Louise Austin (LA). Carrie Canham the curator of Ceredigion museum, Nicola Roberts of the RCAHMW and both Gari Jones and Ywain ap Dylan of Cynnal y Cardi both helped with the overall coordination of the festival.

Preparation for the festival began around 3 months in advance of the festival weekend following initial discussions within the Trust in 2011. During this time AP and LA collated funds from DAT and also from Cynnal Y Cardi.

During these initial planning stages it was agreed that the main activities of the festival should be hosted in the central part of the castle. A license to hold the festival over the weekend of the 28th and 29th July was obtained from Ceredigion County Council and agreement was reached with Cadw over the events to be held within the castle which is a Scheduled Ancient Monument. Activities would also be held at Ceredigion Museum to run alongside the events. The museum is located approximately 800 metres away from the castle on Terrace Road. Carrie Canham, the museum curator met with Trust staff regularly to help plan the coordination between the castle and the museum.

Location

Aberystwyth Castle is situated in the most western area of Aberystwyth town overlooking the Irish Sea and is a Council managed site. There is no admission charge to the castle of which the ruinous gatehouse, curtain walls and towers are the most substantial standing remains. There is a crazy golf and children's play area in close vicinity to the castle as well as public toilets (including disabled). Adjacent to the castle is a car park for around 60 cars which is privately run by St Michael's church as a pay and display car park. The car park is only available to patrons of the church on a Sunday. There is also limited parking running along the promenade in front of the castle. Access to the castle is via a number of different routes

leading through the town, the castle is more commonly visited by people on foot that are 'passing by'.

Activities and demonstrations

Various groups and individuals (voluntary and professional) were contacted to provide demonstrations and activities during the festival. In accordance with the festival theme it was the intent to invite demonstrators to demonstrate activities that were related to either a medieval or Victorian/Edwardian theme. The range of activities, although diverse, complimented each other during the festival.

- Woodturning on a pole lathe
- Basket weaving
- Storytelling
- Spinning and weaving
- Castle tours
- Artefact demonstration and handling
- Clay pot making
- Live musicians, playing traditional and historical music
- Victorian food tasting and cooking demonstrations
- Face painting
- Heraldry design
- Medieval re-enactment group, medieval cooking, myth busters and battle re-enactment
- Sand pit excavation
- Sea-side cut out photo board

Advertising and press releases

Press releases were submitted to the Cambrian News, the Tivy-Side advertiser and also to the Ceredigion County Council press office (Appendix 1) The event was also listed online on the CBA list of nationwide Festival of British Archaeology events and within their event listings booklet distributed nationwide. The event was also publicised by Cadw within their Festival of British Archaeology Events 2012 leaflet circulated in the Heritage magazine. A list of contacts provided by Cynnal y Cardi was also contacted and information posted on several websites including;

The festival was also advertised on the DAT and the RCAHMW official websites as well as on the DAT Facebook and Twitter pages. A bilingual poster for the festival was produced and was distributed around the town of Aberystwyth (see appendix 2). It was also distributed amongst the local tourism information points including Ceredigion Museum and libraries. A bilingual press release was also sent out to all contacts on the DAT contact mailing list. In addition 900 bilingual leaflets were printed and distributed in the local area at shops, restaurants and various other establishments in the Aberystwyth area.

Risk Assessment

A full risk assessment for the festival was carried out after several site visits to the castle (appendix 3).

Final activity/demonstrators booking

Final bookings for demonstrators and activities were made about 4 weeks in advance of the festival and letters providing information and confirming logistics were sent to the demonstrators two weeks before the festival (appendix 4).

Volunteers

Tony Coombe and Matt Davies are regular volunteers with the Trust and manned the artefact demonstration and handling collections. In addition Paul Chapman also volunteered along with younger volunteer, 12 year old Joanna Rees.

Funding

AP was responsible for the budgeting of the festival. The festival is part funded by the Cynnal y Cardi project which is funded through the Rural Development plan for Wales 2007-2012 which is funded by the Welsh Government and the European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development.

All professionals were paid their going rates which included their travelling expenses. All demonstrators were provided with lunch on both days and volunteers who joined us from the Carmarthenshire area were offered accommodation at a local hostel, they were also reimbursed the cost of their evening meal.

Car parking provisions and logistics

The castle is in close proximity to Aberystwyth town centre. Pay and display parking was available at St Michaels Church on the north-eastern edge of the castle. The church kindly agreed to cordon off room for us to park our van and mini bus on both the Saturday and Sunday. Extra room was also made available for us on the Friday and Saturday morning to allow demonstrators to unload their equipment.

Prior to the event locations of all tents and demonstrators was decided after a site visit to Aberystwyth. Ywain ap Dylan from Cynnal y Cardi arranged for two security staff to be present on both the Friday and Saturday nights from 6pm until 8am to ensure the safety of the tents and all equipment left by both the Trust and demonstrators.

Setting up the castle field

Setting up for the festival started on the Friday morning (27th July) with the arrival of the larger DAT tents from Tiger Tents. SR met Tiger Tents on site to ensure that the tents were assembled in the right location. It had been decided beforehand were to position all tents and activities although this was subject to change when we arrived on the Friday. Throughout the day the smaller DAT tents were erected and demonstrators arrived to assemble larger items.

THE EVENT - Festival day Saturday July 28th 2012

In total there were 7 DAT staff present on the Saturday. There were also 2 staff from Cynnal y Cardi who were positioned at one of the main entrances and acted as "meet and greet" hosts along with MB. The weather was dry and overcast in the morning becoming warmer in the afternoon.

The festival was advertised to begin at 10.30am but visitors were present from early morning due to the 'always open' nature of the castle. At midday the festival was busy but not to any critical level. All members of staff and volunteers were able to stay at their assigned role and the schedule of events and activities ran smoothly. An 'A' frame board with a bilingual schedule of events (appendix 5) was placed at two of the main entrances to the castle. A further 'A' frame with a bilingual festival poster was placed next to the children's playground just outside the castle.

At 2pm the attendance at the festival dropped dramatically as visitors left to see the carnival parade which was also taking place in Aberystwyth that day. However by 3pm attendance had recovered and the festival remained busy until the end of the day.

Festival day Sunday July 29th 2012

In total there were 6 DAT staff present on the Saturday. Again there were 2 staff from Cynnal y Cardi positioned again at one of the main entrances again acting as "meet and greet" hosts along with MB. Weather conditions were dry and overcast with one very brief rain shower around 11am. It did remain overcast throughout most of the day but also became warmer. The Mayor visited the festival at 10.30 am and was given a guided tour of all the demonstrators and the DAT tent by Ken Murphy and Sarah Rees.

Activities/demonstrations/events

• Woodturning

Rob Smith demonstrated traditional woodturning craft using a simply constructed pole lathe and allowed supervised "hands on" participation from the festival goers.

Basket Weaving

Helen Campbell had previously demonstrated at both Garn Goch and Carreg Cennen festivals and was happy to return to demonstrate again. Helen set up in one of DAT's tents next to one of the main entrances into the castle. Helen demonstrated various weaving techniques for a range a products. This was another "hands on activity" and was immensely popular on both days; visitors to Helen's tent were able to weave and take home a variety of items including woven headbands, fruit baskets and various hanging shapes.

• Spinning

Castle Tours

Castle tours about the archaeology of Aberystwyth Castle took place 4 times over the weekend and were led by David Browne of the RCAHMW. David Browne is the leading expert in the archaeology of the castle and has conducted excavations of the castle over a number of years. Groups of attending visitors varied in size with the largest group being 15 and the smallest being 7.

• Artefact handling and DAT exhibition tent

Exhibition panels providing information about DAT and current projects relevant to the region (Appendix 6), Archwilio and recent work conducted by the trust were set up inside the DAT tent. A table displaying handling replica artefacts from the Cadw "Treasure Chest" handling collection representing aspects of medieval life was placed just in front of this tent. Volunteer Tony Coombe also displayed his collection of Victorian medical instruments. A member of staff was at the tent at all times to speak to visitors about DAT and current projects, they also collected "Expression of Interest" forms and "evaluation forms" from the visitors. Volunteers Tony Coombe and Matt Davies were at the handling table and were able to demonstrate and discuss the artefacts on the tables with interested visitors.

• Coil and push pot making

This activity was run by Sarah Rees and Felicity Sage with the help of volunteer Joanna Rees and was extremely busy on Saturday. During the day over 120 coil and push pots were made with up to 15 children making pots on occasion. Visitors were able to take their pot home to dry. The 14.5 kilos of clay we purchased for this activity ran out towards the end of the day. Whilst the activity had originally been planned for the two days it was replaced by "Design your own coat of arms" on the Sunday.

• Live musicians

• Victorian food tasting and cooking demonstrations

• Face painting

Although not strictly in keeping with a medieval or Victorian theme the face painting did prove extremely popular. Fiona from Pixiemoon demonstrated her face painting skills on Sunday and throughout the day had a long line of eager visitors waiting to have their faces or arms painted.

• Design your own coat of arms/Crown

This activity run by SR and FS was available on the Sunday and was available in the same tent as face painting. Children were given their own worksheets whilst waiting for face painting and could design their own coat of arms or crown.

• Medieval re-enactment group, medieval cooking, myth busters and battle re-enactment Historical re-enactment group Historia Normannis demonstrated parts of medieval life over the weekend which included medieval cooking, battle re-enactment, medieval clothing, singing workshops and also myth busters. The group of 9 members drew crowds throughout the weekend with their battle re-enactment demonstrations proving the most popular.

Ceredigion Museum events

As part of the Festival Ceredigion Museum held series of events including a children's treasure trail around the galleries. The museum was closed on the Sunday. A town tour led by Michael Freeman left the castle twice during the day to end at the museum. In addition to this a talk entitled '*Revealing Roman life. Finds from Abermagwr Romano-British villa,*

Ceredigion" hosted by Toby Driver. The Young archaeologists club also held a treasure trail around the museum.

Carrie Canham reported that the Museum had a very busy day with visitor numbers increasing by 10 per cent. 15 visitors also arrived for the talk hosted by Toby Driver. In addition the treasure trail was also attended well throughout the day with approximately 30 children taking part. However the town tour which left the castle was not so well attended and it is assumed that visitors did not want to leave the castle to go to another location.

The Punch and Judy shows originally advertised in the Museums schedule was cancelled due to unforeseen problems. They were not included in the weekend's 'what's on' schedule.

Refreshments

As part of our licence to hold the festival at the castle grounds we were not allowed to sell food and drink within the grounds. However as we were close to town refreshments were available locally and an ice cream stand was available, positioned at St Michaels car park during Saturday. Refreshments were also available to purchase on the nearby promenade.

Packing up post festival

Packing up after the festival began that evening as security was not available overnight on Sunday. Tiger Tents arrived at 5pm to pack away their tents and DAT staff cleared packed away our tents and exhibitions. Carrie Canham from Ceredigion Museum arrived to collect their exhibition and the Young Archaeologists excavation sand pit.

No damage occurred over the course of the weekend and there was no litter left on site.

EVALUATION

Visitor figures

Aberystwyth castle is a "free" attraction and is commonly used as a "walk through" en-route to other locations. It is estimated that just over 2000 visitors attended the festival over the weekend. These figures are based on figures from Cynnal y Cardi who acted as "Meet and greet" hosts at one of the main entrances to the castle. The count from Cynnal Y Cardi was 695 on the Saturday and 1052 on the Sunday. Aberystwyth castle however has many entrances to the site so it is believed that the actual numbers of visitors was much higher. Aberystwyth carnival held on the Saturday afternoon also had an effect on visitor numbers as festival visitors left for the carnival procession at 2pm. Visitors who specifically visited the DAT exhibition tent were also counted with 321 visiting on the Saturday and 258 on the Sunday. His suggests that there may well have been higher numbers overall on the Saturday than the Sunday.

Evaluation forms

Evaluation forms for the event were provided by the CBA (appendix 6). Staff from Cynnal y Cardi and MB stopped festival leavers at the main castle entrance and asked them to fill in these evaluation forms and also to place a sticker on the "target boards". These "target boards" were a large target consisting of a red "bull's eye" encircled by a blue and green ring respectively. A dotted line bisected this target. Above each half was a bilingual question; "Did you enjoy your visit?" on one half and "Did you learn something new?" above the other. The red zone indicated the answer "yes", the blue equalled "maybe" and green indicating "no". Festival leavers were asked to place a sticky star on the coloured zone they considered to be their answer. This exercise was most popular with the younger festival audience in particular although some older festival visitors did enjoy the novelty of the sticky star and were happier to complete this exercise rather than fill out an evaluation form. On both targets the red bull's eye was thoroughly covered in stars with some peripheral stars in the blue ring and a few stars in the green ring for both Saturday and Sunday's target (appendix 7).

In addition an unmanned target was placed next to the Clay pot/Heraldry design tent on both Saturday and Sunday. On both targets the red bull's eye was again thoroughly covered in stars with some peripheral stars in the blue ring and in the green ring for both Saturday and Sunday's target.

In total, only 19 completed evaluation forms were returned. Based on the minimum visitor figure of 2000, the return percentage rate is 0.95% which is poor. Such a low response rate is contributed to by the fact that evaluation forms were only available on the Sunday. The results of the evaluation forms are as follows:



Within the age range group, 2 people did not declare their age. Out of the 19 forms completed only 1 of those was in Welsh.

Discussion of results

From this small sample it is encouraging to see that the feedback is largely positive. There was also an option for festival leavers to provide extra information in an "*Any other comments"* box. Of the 19 completed forms only 7 included comments in this box. Below are a few examples from the evaluation forms:

All of the comments received on forms were positive praising various aspects of the festival. Whilst the range of activities and events were quite miscellaneous they proved to be very successful and provided an interesting range and dynamic to the festival.

One of the biggest criticisms raised during conversations with DAT staff during the weekend was the lack of litter bins placed around the site. While there were a number of council bins placed around the castle there was not one within the immediate area of the festival activities and whilst there was a bin placed by DAT staff outside the clay pot tent there were no others immediately available. There did not seem to be, however an on-going problem with litter throughout the weekend and at the end of the weekend DAT staff only removed 2 black bags full of rubbish from the whole site.

Another criticism we received during conversation was that the event was not widely enough publicised. A member of the public commented that we should have advertised in the local paper. In fact the event was advertised in the paper, with a great deal other advertising undertaken in the area to promote the event. Clearly, however, there is always scope for further publicity and as always the marketing strategy is a major consideration for future events.

Meeting the events objectives/legacy

The festival was successful in meeting all of its objectives:

- Provide an accessible and alternative opportunity for people to experience their local heritage.
- To celebrate and showcase this "local heritage" as some of the best of British Archaeology.
- To provide an educational and entertaining event to increase an awareness and knowledge of local heritage.
- To encourage local people to experience and discover their local heritage.
- To attract a diverse audience.

Across the weekend over 2000 visitors attended the festival. These visitors were made up of a diverse audience representing cross generational families, local people and visiting tourists as well as a small number of disabled and wheelchair bound visitors. Whilst the biggest visitor numbers came from 'passers-by' according to the evaluation forms, it is important to note that these visitors did stay to experience the range of activities with some returning on the Sunday. These people may not have envisioned themselves attending an archaeology festival however were quite happy to engage with the festival itself which provided an enjoyable and alternative experience of the castle which was accessible to all.

In addition DAT also had some objectives which were also part of our funding application to Cynnal y Cardi;

• Help to establish new networks between community groups and individuals with the organisations represented which will continue to be built upon in the future.

• Strengthen future partnerships between organisations through having developed new areas of joint working

• Provide information to members of the public on how to continue to access existing historic environment information resources which will help and encourage them to use these resources in the future

• Provide an opportunity for members of the public to try out new skills

• Reach a diverse audience and enrich people's knowledge and experience of their historic environment.

Whilst organising the festival we were able to meet and work with different individual and community groups which has enable DAT to strengthen its links in the area. In addition to this we were able to engage with many local visitors to the festival and discuss our current projects in the area as well as identify areas where new community projects may exist.

The festival attracted a varied audience and therefore achieved a number of these objectives. Twenty two "Contact Database registration" forms were completed by festival visitors who were keen to remain in contact with DAT and be informed of additional events and opportunities. This data has now been added to the DAT contacts database and mailing lists.

Elsewhere on the form the question "*How did you find out about the event?"* also provided a brief glimpse of quite critical information. From the number of visitors it was clear that the event had been advertised successfully even though 35 per cent of visitors (albeit from this sample) were passers-by. The first most successful form of advertising was the press releases in the local newspapers. This was then followed by online advertising and then the sightings of the posters and leaflets. Word of mouth also appeared to be quite effective which the increase of visitor numbers on the Sunday been contributed too by Saturday's visitors recommendations.

As a result of the event contact was made with a variety of organisations including CAVs and a north Ceredigion Home Education group who are keen to develop a partnership with DAT to develop and deliver new learning opportunities in North Ceredigion.

Information was also provided by visitors on historic buildings and sites which local communities might be interested to research and record. In particular another possible Cegin Foch building outside of Llanrhystud was identified .

Talks are also currently on-going with Ceredigion Museum regarding a possible community excavation at Llannon.

Post festival administration

After the festival Sarah Rees contacted the demonstrators individually by email to thank them for their contribution to the festival. All of the individuals and groups involved reported having an enjoyable time and wished to be contacted again for future events. They all also offered positive feedback on the event

Invoices were sent directly to Cynnal y Cardi by demonstrators for payment 30 days from date of invoice.

Reflections and recommendations

Overall DAT, Ceredigion Museum, RCAHMW and Cynnal y Cardi consider the event to be a success. The event was visited by a great number of people who an enjoyable time in a relaxed atmosphere. These were for the greater part visitors who had not made the decision to visit the event but people who came across it. There was a mixture of visiting tourists as well people local to the area and for most, the festival provided an opportunity to discover or to rediscover, the local archaeology and heritage and to celebrate this in an interactive and inclusive environment.

The success of this festival could not have been possible without the efficient teamwork and support of the DAT, Ceredigion museum and RCAHMW staff collaboration. Financial support and assistance from Cynnal y Cardi was also integral to this achievement.

The two previous festivals have given DAT much insight into how to organise an event of this size and the valuable lessons learnt at Garn Goch and Carreg Cennen mean that this year's festival was executed with no major issues of grievances. Early planning and preparation as

well as delegation of tasks between DAT, Ceredigion museum, RCAHMW and Cynnal y Cardi proved again to be efficient way of ensuring the festival ran smoothly.

When planning for this festival the previous festivals report at Carreg Cennen was referred to on a number of occasions. In particular the 'reflections and recommendations' were taken on board to ensure the Aberystwyth Festival acknowledged any important issues. However it would seem that every event is unique and the same issues did not apply to Aberystwyth as had for Carreg Cennen. The most important key components of this festival differed somewhat to those of the earlier festival.

• An efficient and productive collaboration between DAT, Ceredigion Museum, RCAHMW and Cynnal y Cardi ensured an effective delegation of tasks and responsible for a successful output.

• New relationships made with local groups and individuals have meant establishing new links which has not only increased our presence in Ceredigion but also helped benefit local groups and individuals.

• A varied and dynamic advertising strategy should be employed to reach a more far reaching and varied audience.

• An easily accessible and familiar location does not ensure greater attendance however it does offer potential for 'passers-by', who might not normally be interested in attending an 'Archaeology' event to be attracted. Holding an event at an attraction already free to enter means there is no extra 'pull factor' to see an historic attraction.

• A varied range of "hands on" and interactive activities and events are most popular.

Finally a quick summary of some of the weaker components of the festival and recommendations for future events:

- To ensure that more provision is made for the disposal of litter on site
- Further and more extensive efforts should be made to advertise events more widely.





Can you help?

This modest little building located on a small holding just outside Lampeter, is a remarkable find. It was probably built in the mid 19th Century and served as a Cegin Fach or most likely, a Cegin Foch. As a domestic outhouse, its primary function was as a place to prepare food for pigs.

Beneath its zinc corregated roof survives a thatch roof and a splendid wicker fire hood. It is a rare survival of the area's rich agricultural and vernacular heritage and is most likely to be the last remaining building of its kind in the area.

This building was recorded by archaeologists from the Dyfed Archaeological Trust and the RCAHMW with the help of local volunteers and with encouragement from Cynnal Y

Cardi. The building however, is in a very vulnerable state and is unlikely to survive for much longer. With enough interest and support, we hope that this building will be able to receive some conservation work so that it might be preserved as a testimony to its past and to promote the area's rich agricultural heritage.




Target board, Main Entrance. Saturday 28th July 2012
