

# LLAWHADEN HOSPICE 1992/1993 PRN3577

#### LLAWHADEN POTTERY REPORT

A total of 172 sherds of pottery was found on the site. This report concentrates on the Medieval pottery recovered. Table 1 shows the total range of fabrics present and an accompanying type fabric list gives their approximate date range. A fuller report is housed with the main site archive.

#### Discussion

The medieval pottery comprises `local'fabrics and one other unsourced Welsh or English ware. A 12th-16th or early 17th century date range is suggested for Dyfed gravel-tempered wares (TF.1A and 1B) and a mid-late 13th-14th century date is given to Llanstephan-type (TF.2A and 2B) wares. The unsourced painted ware (TF.3) is of probable 13th-14th century date. A handful of sherds in an unglazed cooking pot fabric (TF.4A) are thought to be from North Devon and are not closely datable; North Devon cooking pots were made over a long period of time, from c. 1200-1500 (O'Mahoney forthcoming).

The later pottery comprises a range of fabrics that span the period from the 17th to the 20th centuries. These come from a variety of sources. There is only one continental import, a 17th-18th century stoneware from Germany (TF.5). Non-local English imports include 17th-18th century wares from North Devon (TF.4A-C) and Staffordshire or Bristol (TF.6). A range of 19th-early 20th century glazed red earthenwares for dairy and kitchen use (TF.8 and TF.9) are unsourced but are typical of vessels produced at many small country potteries. Also represented are miscellaneous unsourced stonewares (TF.9) and fine whitewares (TF.10), mass-produced types most probably arriving from Staffordshire.

The bulk of the pottery comes from unstratified contexts, mainly from the topsoil and nearly all of the medieval pottery is residual (see Table 2).

#### Catalogue

Type Fabric 1.A and 1.B

Dyfed gravel-tempered wares are characteristically hard and gritty. Surfaces are buff-orange and a reduced grey core is frequently observed. A few unglazed cooking pot sherds are sooted externally near to the base. Distinctive inclusions are platey shale and sandstone gravels (appearing red in oxidised and grey in reduced areas) and a little quartz. The size and frequency of inclusions vary indicating more than one centre of production. Similar variations were noted when West Wales fabrics were first defined (O'Mahoney 1985, 20-24), and the first attempts at distinguishing these wares was carried out in a recent study of pottery from Carmarthen Greyfriars (O'Mahoney forthcoming).

Dyfed gravel-tempered wares have an uncertain date of origin. At Laugharne Castle they are found in 12th century contexts (Papazian and Campbell 1992, 56), and at Carmarthen Greyfriars they occur in the earliest phases dating to the mid-late 13th century (O'Mahoney forthcoming). In an assemblage from Newport, Pembrokeshire, they were found in association with late 12th and 13th century Ham Green pottery from Bristol (Brennan forthcoming). The terminal date for locally produced gravel-tempered wares is likewise uncertain. A 16th or early 17th century date is suggested, after which North Devon wares dominate the market (Papazian and Campbell 1992, 56).

Type 1.A vessels are unglazed and comprise hand-made cooking pots, jugs and at least one bowl or dish. The few jug sherds and the bowl or dish may originally have been glazed as these few sherds are now heavily abraded. A variety of cooking pots are represented (Cat Nos. I and 2) and the few jug rims are simple types with a slight neck cordon. Not enough of the bowl/dish survives to determine its profile.

Four sherds of Type 1.B glazed gravel-tempered ware were recovered from the site. Identifiable sherds are from jugs of the same simple type described above (Cat No.3). These have thin traces of green glaze externally. One uncertain vessel (1993: Trench 2, [02]), is glazed yellow-brown internally and has spots of glaze on a sooted exterior.

- 1. Cooking pot. Upright rim, incurved with bevelled top. Unglazed. 1992: Trench 2 context [12].
- 2. Cooking pot. Upright rim with inward-sloping ?lid-seated top. Unglazed. 1993: [018] lower ditch fill.
- 3. Jug. Flat-topped rim with neck cordon. Traces of green glaze externally. 1993: Topsoil.

Type Fabric 2.A

A small quantity of local Llanstephan-type calcareous ware was found on the site. Sherds vary in hardness with some being very hard-fired. Surfaces are mostly buff coloured and all fragments are partly reduced. Small white calcareous flecks and tiny surface voids are characteristic of the ware. Other inclusions are sparse `local'gravels and very occasional fine sands. Vessels are glazed green externally. In most cases surfaces are abraded and the remaining glaze is thin and patchy. The hard-fired sherds have a good all-over glaze and are visually of better quality. These may be from later vessels or alternatively they may be derived from a different local source. Llanstephan-type wares were made either in or near Carmarthen (O'Mahoney forthcoming) or somewhere along the Carmarthen estuary (Papazian and Campbell 1992, 67) though more than one production centre is possible.

A mid to late 13th century origin is suggested for these wares at Carmarthen Greyfriars, continuing into the 14th century (O'Mahoney forthcoming).

At Llawhaden all recorded sherds are from jugs. Diagnostic sherds include one rim (Cat No.4), part of a base (1992: Trench 7, topsoil) with intermittent thumb-pressed decoration, and one body sherd (1992: Trench 4, [4] ditch fill) with a band of horizontal grooves and additional incised decoration in the form of a zig-zag line.

4. Jug. Hollow rim with a plain lip. A wide strap handle springing from the rim has a row of vertical slashes where it meets the lip and diagonal slashes along its length. Traces of green glaze externally. 1992: Trench 2 [11].

#### Type Fabric 2.B

Two sherds from the shoulder of a jug (1992: Trench 6, topsoil and Trench 4 [4] ditch fill) are in a fine white-fired fabric which is identified as Llanstephan painted ware. The wheel-thrown jug has numerous surface voids and contains a few fine sands and occasional small red inclusions. Both sherds have a pale greenish-yellow exterior glaze and a band painted greenish-brown between two horizontal grooves.

In a recent survey of medieval and later pottery in Wales, Llanstephan painted wares were shown to be less common than other contemporary Llanstephan wares (Papazian and Campbell 1992, 67-8).

#### Type Fabric 3

A jug (1993: [018] lower ditch fill) in an unclassified Welsh or English fabric has painted decoration similar to the jug in type fabric 2.B. The hand-thrown jug is in a hard granular fabric which is off-white with a pink tinge. It contains abundant fine sands and frequent red-brown gravels which are similar to those found in the `local'gravel-tempered wares. Externally, a thin yellowish-green glaze has bright copper-green spots or flecks. Around the body a broad painted band appears dark brown over an orange-red slip. The sagging base is thumb-pressed externally. A 13th or 14th century date is likely for this vessel.

#### POTTERY TYPE FABRIC TOTALS

TF.1A Unglazed Dyfed gravel-tempered ware

Forms: Hand-made cooking pots, jugs and at least one bowl, the latter two may have since lost any surface glaze. A variety of cooking pot rims are represented and the few jug rims are all simple types with a slight cordon on the neck.

Fabric: Generally hard and gritty. Buff through to orange sometimes with a grey core. A few sherds are sooted externally near to the base. The distinctive inclusions are platey ?shale and ?sandstone gravels with some quartz. The size and frequency of inclusions vary, indicating more than one source. Whilst some sherds have only small amounts of quartz others have equal quantities of quartz and gravels. Variations in the fabric are previously noted elsewhere (O'Mahoney 1985, 20-24) The first attempts at distinguishing `local'wares was carried out on a study of pottery from Carmarthen Greyfriars (O'Mahoney forthcoming).

Date: `Local'gravel-tempered wares have an uncertain starting date. At Laugharne Castle they are found in 12th century contexts (Papazian and Campbell 1992, 56). At Carmarthen Greyfriars they occur in the earliest phases dated to the mid-late 13th century (O'Mahoney, forthcoming). At Newport, Pembrokeshire similar unglazed wares were found in association with late 12th and 13th century Ham Green pottery from Bristol (Brennan and Murphy, forthcoming). The terminal date for locally produced gravel-tempered ware is likewise uncertain. A 16th or early 17th century date is suggested (ibid, 56).

Cooking pots =17 Jugs =4 Bowl/dish =1

TF.1B Glazed Dyfed gravel-tempered ware

Forms: Jugs. Two rims are represented, both simple types with slight neck cordons.

Fabric: As TF. 1A all containing a small quantity of quartz. The two jug rims and one body sherd have thin traces of green glaze externally. A single body sherd from an uncertain vessel (Trench 2, [02]), is glazed yellow-brown internally and has spots of glaze on a sooted exterior.

Date: As TF.1A.

Jugs =3 Uncertain form =1

#### TF.2A Llanstephan-type calcareous ware

Forms: Jugs. The one surviving rim (Trench 2 [11]) is hollow with a plain lip. A wide strap handle springing from the rim has a row of vertical slashes where it meets the lip and diagonal slashes along its length. The only base sherd is flat with intermittent thumb-pressed decoration (Trench 7, topsoil). One body sherd with a band of horizontal grooves has additional decoration in the form of an incised zig-zag line (Trench 4, [4] ditch fill).

Fabric: The fabric varies in hardness with some sherds being well fired. Surfaces are mostly buff coloured and all sherds are partly reduced; usually at the core. Small white calcareous flecks and numerous tiny voids are characteristic of the ware. All contain sparse `local'gravels and very occasional fine sands. Vessels are green-glazed externally.

In most cases surfaces are abraded and the surviving glaze is thin and patchy. The hard-fired sherds have a good allover olive-green glaze and may represent later vessels in this fabric or are from a different local source. Llanstephan-type wares were made either in or near Carmarthen (O'Mahoney, forthcoming) or somewhere along the Carmarthen estuary (Papazian and Campbell 1992, 67).

Date: A mid-late 13th cent origin is suggested for these wares at the Friary (O'Mahoney forthcoming), continuing into the 14th century.

Jugs = 5

TF.2BLlanstephan-type white fabric - painted

Forms: Jug represented by two shoulder fragments.

Fabric: A fine off-white fabric with numerous small surface voids. Contains few fine sands and occasional small red inclusions. Both shoulder sherds have a pale greenish-yellow exterior glaze and a band painted greenish-brown between two horizontal grooves. Wheel-thrown.

Date: In a recent survey of medieval and later pottery in Wales, Llanstephan painted wares were shown to be less common than other Llanstephan-type fabrics (Papazian and Campbell 1992, 67-8).

Date: As TF.2A.

Jug = 1

TF.3 Unclassified - Welsh/English - painted

Forms: Jug with painted decoration similar to TE2B. A hand-thrown jug with slightly sagging, thumb-pressed base. Context [018] Lower ditch fill. SE2.

Fabric: A hard granular fabric, off-white with a pink tinge. Tempered with abundant fine sands and frequent red and reddish-brown gravels which are similar to those found in the `local'gravel-tempered wares. Externally a thin yellowish-green glaze has green copper flecks/spots. Around the body a broad painted band appears dark brown over an orange-red slip.

Date: Medieval, probably 13th century

Jug = 1

TF.4A Unglazed North Devon gravel-tempered ware

Forms: A few unglazed sherds (context [017] and [111]) are in what looks to be a North Devon cooking pot fabric.

Fabric: A very hard fabric with buff-orange surfaces and a grey core. Tempered with frequent quartz grits and occasional red gravels. A base sherd is fire-blackened externally. Hand-thrown.

In most cases surfaces are abraded and the surviving glaze is thin and patchy. The hard-fired sherds have a good allover olive-green glaze and may represent later vessels in this fabric or are from a different local source. Llanstephan-type wares were made either in or near Carmarthen (O'Mahoney, forthcoming) or somewhere along the Carmarthen estuary (Papazian and Campbell 1992, 67).

Date: A mid-late 13th cent origin is suggested for these wares at the Friary (O'Mahoney forthcoming), continuing into the 14th century.

Jugs = 5

TF.2BLlanstephan-type white fabric - painted

Forms: Jug represented by two shoulder fragments.

Fabric: A fine off-white fabric with numerous small surface voids. Contains few fine sands and occasional small red inclusions. Both shoulder sherds have a pale greenish-yellow exterior glaze and a band painted greenish-brown between two horizontal grooves. Wheel-thrown.

Date: In a recent survey of medieval and later pottery in Wales, Llanstephan painted wares were shown to be less common than other Llanstephan-type fabrics (Papazian and Campbell 1992, 67-8).

Date: As TF.2A.

Jug = 1

TF.3 Unclassified - Welsh/English - painted

Forms: Jug with painted decoration similar to TF.2B. A hand-thrown jug with slightly sagging, thumb-pressed base. Context [018] Lower ditch fill. SF.2.

Fabric: A hard granular fabric, off-white with a pink tinge. Tempered with abundant fine sands and frequent red and reddish-brown gravels which are similar to those found in the `local'gravel-tempered wares. Externally a thin yellowish-green glaze has green copper flecks/spots. Around the body a broad painted band appears dark brown over an orange-red slip.

Date: Medieval, probably 13th century

Jug = 1

TF.4A Unglazed North Devon gravel-tempered ware

Forms: A few unglazed sherds (context [017] and [111]) are in what looks to be a North Devon cooking pot fabric.

Fabric: A very hard fabric with buff-orange surfaces and a grey core. Tempered with frequent quartz grits and occasional red gravels. A base sherd is fire-blackened externally. Hand-thrown.

Date: Medieval-late medieval, 1200-1500. Not closely datable.

Rim Body:pl/dec Base:pl/dec Handle Total Vessels 0 5 0 1 0 0 6 2

Cooking pots =2?

TF.4B Glazed North Devon gravel-tempered ware

Forms: All identifiable rim sherds are from large bowls or basins and jars. One body sherd with traces of brown glaze externally may be from a jug and is of uncertain North Devon/Dyfed fabric (Trench 8, topsoil).

Fabric: The standard North Devon fabric (for fabric description see Allan 1984, 148-9 and Evans 1979, 18-29). With one exception (above) vessels are glazed internally in shades of olive-green through to brown.

Date: 16th-18th century, though most excavated groups within Dyfed and south Wales are 17th and 18th century.

Rim Body:pl/dec Base:pl/dec Handle Total Vessels 10 28 0 7 0 0 45 21

Bowls/basins =4

Jars = 1

Jug =1? externally glazed uncertain Devon/Dyfed.

Indeterminate =15 - most are from bowls and jars.

TF.4C North Devon slipware

Forms: Indeterminate. The one surviving rim sherd is too small to determine a profile.

Fabric: A hard orange-red fabric, the rim having a grey core. Tempered with small amounts of quartz and probably classed as gravel-free. The base of one vessel has a white slip internally with a clear overglaze, appearing yellow. The one rim sherd is double-glazed in the same manner.

Date: 17th-mid 18th century (Allan 1984, 132).

Rim Body:pl/dec Base:pl/dec Handle Total Vessels 1 0 0 3 0 0 4 2

Indeterminate =2

TF.5 German stoneware, Westerwald

Forms: Jug represented by a single decorated body sherd ([102] topsoil).

Fabric: A grey salt-glazed stoneware with cobalt-oxide under-glaze colour externally. Decorated with applied press-moulded self-coloured buttons.

Date: Late 17th-18th century. For similar decoration cf. two jugs from a pit group in Exeter dated 1680-90 (Allan 1984, 191, fig. 104, nos.2320 and 2322).

Rim Body:pl/dec Base:pl/dec Handle Total Vessels 0 0 1 0 0 0 1 1

Jug = 1

TF.6 Staffordshire/Bristol-type slipware

Forms: Press-moulded dish with pie-crust edge ([151] topsoil).

Fabric: Hard creamy-buff fabric tempered with occasional red inclusions and small amounts of sand. The interior is coated with a dark red slip with a white slip over and then combed, appearing brown and yellow beneath a clear glaze.

Date: Late 17th-mid 18th century

Dish = 1

TF.7Black-glazed red earthenware

Forms: 3 sherds represent 3 vessels. They are a bowl or basin, a press-moulded dish with notched edge and a possible jar. (Trench 6, topsoil; Trench 8, topsoil; Trench 1, layer []1]).

Fabric: A hard red fabric marled with white clay and tempered with sparse red gravels and quartz sands. The bowl and dish are glazed internally, the jar is double-glazed.

Date: Probably 19th century

Bowl = 1

Dish = 1

Jar? = 1

TF.8 Brown-glazed red earthenware, plain and slip-decorated

Forms: Includes sherds from two large bowls or basins (1993 U/S and T2 [02]) with internal brown glaze and white slip-trailed bands which appear yellow beneath a clear glaze. Also parts of two indeterminate forms, both internally glazed (T1 [1] and T2 [02].

Fabric: Unsourced red earthenwares. Types made at many of the country potteries.

Date: 19th-early 20th century

Bowls/basins =2

Indeterminate =2

TF.9 English stonewares, miscellaneous

Forms: Comprise sherds from jars and bottles all from the topsoil(T5 topsoil; 1993 U/S; T2 [102]).

Fabrics: Unsourced grey and buff coloured stonewares with salt-glazed and clear-glazed surfaces.

Date: 19th-20th century

Rim Body:pl/dec Base:pl/dec Handle Total Vessels 0 3 0 0 0 0 3 3

Jars/bottles = 3

TF.10 Whiteware (miscellaneous earthenware and china)

Forms: Various. 7 discarded sherds from context [002]/[015] and 3 from T2 [02] were not fully recorded, ie. whether they were rim, body or base sherds; the number of vessels is likewise unknown.

Fabrics: Mainly white-bodied earthenwares with some hard-paste porcelain or china which included wares with banded and sponged decoration.

Date: 19th and 20th century

The total number of sherds was 15 and the minimum number of vessels was c.7.

Miscellaneous vessels =c.7

TF.11 Unclassified - unglazed red earthenware

Forms: One indeterminate body sherd from the topsoil in trench 6.

Fabric: A hard red fabric with occasional red inclusions and some fine sands. Unsourced.

Date: Post-med, probably late.

Indeterminate =1

#### WINDOW GLASS REPORT

The glass from the Hospice is fragmentary and the condition of it varies. A few pieces are totally denatured with laminated surfaces. The majority are stable though fully opaque and brown-black in colour. Semi-opaque pieces whose original colour can be determined are mostly clear with a very pale green tint (in reflected light), some are stained blue and others a yellowish-brown `amber'colour. The few surviving edges are grozed and include at least one circular quarry which has a pronounced curved edge. Most fragments are between 2.5mm and 5mm thick.

55 painted pieces bear parts of foliated patterns painted in a red-brown colour, a few of which have been illustrated for archive purposes. The overall design is unclear but a 14th century date is likely.

#### **VESSEL GLASS**

A total of 17 fragments of vessel glass was found on the site. None is earlier than the 19th century and most pieces are of very recent date. The 19th century vessels comprise wine bottles (3) and a household bottle (1) for medicine or tonics. The more recent glass includes miscellaneous bottle and jar fragments (13).

Only one vessel fragment was kept, all other pieces were uninformative and of no special interest.
