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1. Introduction

- 1.1 Mynydd y Ffynnon Project: Background.
- 1.1.1 The area termed the Mynydd y Ffynnon survey area occupies part of a large block of upland in the heart of the Cambrian Mountains in central Wales between the Castell valley on the north, the Ystwyth Valley on the south, the Rheidol Valley on the west and the Wye Valley to the east (see Project Design: The Archaeology and Historic Landscapes of the Mynydd y Ffynnon Area, prepared by Archaeoleg Cambria Archaeology and the Clwyd-Powys Archaeological Trust, 1997). The area is bisected by the Ceredigion/Powys county border.
- 1.1.2 The 'Mynydd y Ffynnon Landscape Study Area' was defined by the above named rivers and the A44 trunk road, which links Aberystwyth with east Wales. The area is characterised by a landscape of open moorland and forestry plantations, rising to a maximum height of 573m OD, and is a land block that falls within the Cambrian Mountains ESA. ADAS and Forest Enterprise, as large landowners and land agents in the region, developed a joint project for Mynydd y Ffynnon which is termed 'a new Welsh upland vision for the restoration of upland ecosystems' and is defined as:

"a pilot scheme for the uplands aimed at restoring indigenous upland habitats and their wildlife conservation whilst ensuring that there are true economic returns for forestry and agriculture and hence the rural economy of the same area."


- 1.1.3 Between 1996 and 2001, Cambria Archaeology (The Dyfed Archaeological Trust) and the Clwyd-Powys Archaeological Trust (CPAT) have conducted a series of joint archaeological surveys within the Mynydd y Ffynnon Landscape Study Area. The various stages of this work were funded by ADAS, Forest Enterprise and the Royal Commission on Ancient and Historic Monuments in Wales (RCAHMW).
- **1.1.4** The phases of the survey undertaken prior to 2000-2001 were carried out in the following order;
- **PHASE 1:** In 1996, Phase 1 of the project, focused on an Archaeological Survey Area on ADAS owned land in the centre of the Mynydd y Ffynnon Landscape Study Area. A detailed desk-top survey of the landscape history of the wider Landscape Study Area was carried out at the same time (Sambrook & Silvester, 1997).
- PHASE 2: As a continuation of the 1996 study, a programme of detailed survey of blocks of upland and valley floor on privately owned land along the Castell, Rheidol and Ystwyth valleys. This work was carried out during the early summer of 1997, providing valuable contextual, distributional and site-specific information for the Mynydd y Ffynnon project and assisting considerably in building a picture of past land-use and activity in the area between the Wye and the Ystwyth (Silvester, 1997; Sambrook & Darke, 1997).
- PHASE 3: Was carried out during the autumn of 1997 and was a detailed survey and assessment of known archaeological sites within the Forest Enterprise owned, afforested portions of the Mynydd y Ffynnon Study Area (Sambrook, Harkinson & Thomas, 1997).
- **PHASE 4:** In the spring of 1998, ADAS owned land outside the Phase 1 survey area was surveyed. There was also limited prospecting for new archaeological sites in select areas of Forest Enterprise owned land. An element of the forest survey of the Phase 4 work was funded by the FE in order that the Phase 3 and FE related Phase 4 project results could be reported as *The Mynydd y Ffynnon Archaeological Assessment* as part of FE's wider *Welsh Heritage Assets* project.


PHASE 5: The fifth phase of work was purely desktop based and designed to produce two concluding reports on management issues surrounding sites on ADAS and FE land;

- i) A synthesis of previous work relating to sites located on both ADAS and FE land within the Mynydd y Ffynnon Landscape Study area, providing descriptions and management recommendations for all such sites (Sambrook, 1999)
- ii) A report funded as part of the Forest Enterprise Welsh Heritage Assets Project and concerned only with those sites located on FE land within the Mynydd y Ffynnon Landscape Study area (Hall, Sambrook & Thomas, 1998)

1.2 Methodology

- **1.2.1** This report presents the results of the sixth phase of the Mynydd y Ffynnon project. Undertaken during the winter of 2000-2001, this final phase of fieldwork was funded by the RCAHMW as part of the wider Uplands Initiative strategy. It was designed to complete the field survey of the entire land block of the 'Mynydd y Ffynnon Landscape Study Area.'
- **1.2.2** This involved the survey of approximately 12km^2 of private farmland which had not been included in the previous phases of work along the northern side of the upper Ystwyth valley. This was carried out by a two man team. Where appropriate, 30m transects were walked, but in practice the nature of the local landscape usually devalues this approach. Nevertheless, the objective of achieving thorough coverage of the study area was achieved.





2. Results.

2.1 Recording and reporting.

- **2.1.1** Each new site identified by the field survey has been given a unique Primary Reference Number (PRN) and its details entered into the regional Sites & Monuments Record (SMR) databases maintained by Cambria Archaeology.
- **2.1.2** The content of the site gazetteer is a based on the information presented to the RCAHMW in a Fox-pro project database. The project database includes extra information regarding many of the sites in the survey area than appear in this report. The database structure follows the RCAHMW's own specifications. Some recommendations for amendments to the Glossary of Terms issued by the RCAHMW for use with this project are presented below.
- **2.1.3** The project archive will be presented to the RCAHMW separate to this report and includes digital and slide photographs and field notes and maps.

2.2 Glossary Recommendations

The following glossary terms were used in the project database which do not appear in the recommended glossary provided by the RCAHMW:

- ROOT VEGETABLE STORE
- PLATFORM
- PEAT DRYING PLATFORM
- SHELTER
- SUNKEN SHELTER

Each of these terms are important in the context of upland survey work in south-west and mid-Wales and their addition to the approved glossary is considered essential. They are included in the Uplands Glossary prepared by Cambria Archaeology for the RCAHMW during 2000.

3. Summary

The Mynydd y Ffynnon 2000-2001 Survey was undertaken during the winter of 2000-2001. It was the sixth and final phase of archaeological survey in the Mynydd y Ffynnon Landscape Study Area.

The fieldwork was funded by the RCAHMW as part of the wider Uplands Initiative strategy and designed to complete the field survey of the entire land block of the Mynydd y Ffynnon Landscape Study Area. Approximately 12km² of private farmland was surveyed by a two man team along the northern side of the upper Ystwyth valley.

Each stage of the Mynydd y Ffynnon survey has added valuable information to expand our understanding of the settlement and land-use history of the district. The fieldwork component of the project in particular has added information which could not possibly be gleaned from other sources.

A picture emerges of mediaeval and post-mediaeval settlement across the whole area, focused particularly on sheltered river and stream valleys and associated mostly with the use of the mountain pastures for pastoral farming. During 2000-2001, a number of well preserved and highly significant Deserted Rural Settlement sites were recorded for the first time, and other known sites re-evaluated.

It is important to draw attention to the cluster of deserted settlements and ancillary features located on the land of Cae'r Meirch and Dolygors farms, north of Hafod and west of Pwllpeiran (e.g. NPRNs 66535, 66536, 66547, 66550, 66597, 66599, 66620, 66623.) They may be associated with the mediaeval monastic grange of Cwmystwyth or indeed with the division of the land following the Dissolution. A significant upland deserted settlement was also identified at Graig Wen, Cwmystwyth (NPRN 66683), which may be a genuine mediaeval hafod site.

In the Tai Newyddion and Cwmystwyth areas a significant number (12) of peat drying platforms were recognised and recorded for the first time, indicating the degree of importance and scale of peat cutting activity on the moorland above the valley.

The search for and exploitation of metal ores has also contributed greatly to the archaeological resource of the area, with metal mine sites and associated features such as water leats and trial workings commonly encountered. The heart of the 2000-2001 study area includes the historic Cwmystwyth lead mine and the nearby workings on Copa Hill, some of which of known Bronze Age date. However, the project design excluded the survey of mining features within the Cwmystwyth/Copa Hill mining area. The complexity and scale of these sites requires a specific series of projects in future to do justice to such an important focus of mining activity. A small number of associated features including a trial level and a hushing pond and leat outside the main mine area were however recorded by the survey (NPRNs 66591, 66594, 66674).

Prior to the 2000-2001 survey, little identifiable trace remains of earlier historic and prehistoric activity was known in the district. This phase of the project has succeeded in making significant additions to the handful of bronze age cairns previously known to be found on higher ground. Three ring barrows, six cairns, a possible burnt mound and a possible hut circle (NPRN 66673) were found, distributed widely across the study area.

Such is the value of the results of the series of Mynydd y Ffynnon archaeological survey, both to local and regional archaeology, it is anticipated that the material gathered between 1996-2001 will form the basis of a contribution to an academic publication in the future.

The early history of this mill is unresearched but its identification as Pentre Mill on the parish tithe survey and its location near the historic settlement of Pentre Briwnant suggest that it probably has at least early post-mediaeval origins. It was not a working mill by the late 19th century and has not been occupied by at least several decades before the end of the 20th century, indeed it had become completely ruined by the end of that century. The mill cottage and its associated buildings are now completely ruinous and have either collapsed or been demolished. The largest building within the complex is now a rectilinear mound of stone with many of the roof timbers mixed in with the rubble. A smaller building to the west has largely disappeared, with only the western gable wall standing to c.2m in height. There is no trace of a third building shown on the parish tithe map, which stood a few metres to the east of the main building. It is worth noting that the level garden/yard area between the buildings and the Ystwyth to the south is evidently in part built up ground. The riverbank in front of the garden has been strengthened by revetting with large stone slabs. It is also clear that there was a subterranean tailrace running from the now infilled wheelpit across to the riverbank. A substantial earthwork leat, which is actually stone cut for the first 50m or so of its course, taps into the Ystwyth about 300m upstream. The leat is cut by late 19th century mining features, indicating that the mill was defunct by that time.
