1.0 SUMMARY

A level 1 building survey was undertaken by Cambria Archaeology on behalf of the Welsh Development Agency, of military buildings at Aberporth Airfield prior to the demolition of the buildings and redevelopment of the site. Based on various cartographic sources, photographic records and a field visit, phases of development and alteration to buildings, and the site as a whole, have been suggested. A descriptive gazetteer, plans and exterior photographs are presented in this report. Further documentary research proved unfruitful, or beyond the scope of this project.

2.0 INTRODUCTION

This desk top survey was undertaken by Cambria Archaeology Field Operations in response to a request from the Welsh Development Agency (WDA) to carry out the recording of surviving buildings at the former Aberporth Airfield, and to provide further documentary research into the site and its use as a Polish resettlement camp after the Second World War. The former airfield is to be redeveloped by the WDA as a business park. The work is to be carried out in two phases, the first phase, initially involving the demolition of the existing airfield buildings.

The airfield (PRN30594) is situated to the north of the settlement of Blaenannerch within the parish of Aberporth, at OS map reference SN 2550049500. The underlying geology of the site is of Llandeilo to Ashgill rock comprising Argillaceous rocks with subequal interbedded strata of sandstone.

A previous archaeological assessment of the airfield was undertaken by the Lancaster University Archaeological Unit (LUAU) as part of an Environmental Impact Assessment on behalf of White Young Green Environmental Consultancy. This assessment included a comprehensive search of reference sources for background to the history of the airfield. This assessment suggested that "fuller search of plans and aerial photographs will be undertaken than was possible in the initial survey, to ensure that all original fabric is identified and that a complete development history can be established. Further research will also be undertaken on the Polish resettlement camp. This will comprise local investigations into peoples' memories of the site as well as wider documentary research. Contact could also be made with the Federation of Poles in Great Britain to determine whether they have members with recollections of the camp at Aberporth."

A field survey also undertaken as part of the assessment was unable to gain access to buildings, or to photograph within the airfield site for reasons of security. After the site was vacated, however, security restrictions were lifted, and a photographic and video survey of the exterior and interior of the buildings was undertaken by Jones Brothers, Henllan Ltd. before the stripping and demolition of the airfield buildings was commenced. Some of these photographs are included in this report.

3.0 AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

The project objectives as outlined in the project brief set by Cambria Archaeology (Development Control) were to record through further research and written descriptions, the history of the surviving airfield buildings, identifying and recording all original elements of the buildings (conforming to level 1 as defined in 'Recording Historic Buildings'- a descriptive specification issued by the Royal Commission on the Historical Monuments of England 1990). This level of recording is minimal, generally comprising of a photographic record of the building exterior, a brief description of the building and an identification of its location. In addition, this report, and a project archive were to be produced.

4.0 METHODOLOGY

A site visit was undertaken as part of the present assessment during the stripping and demolition of the buildings. Because several of the buildings were being dismantled simultaneously and asbestos was being removed (and because of other health and safety issues) it was not possible to make a photographic or descriptive record for some of the buildings. It was considered that the photographic survey undertaken by Lewis Jones already provided sufficiently detailed coverage of the interior and exterior of the buildings from which descriptions could be derived. Unfortunately, some buildings not included in the photographic survey, were in the process of being demolished during the site visit, and could not be recorded.

Archive records for inclusion within the regional Sites and Monuments Record (SMR), were created for all buildings associated with the airfield that could be identified either on cartographic coverage of the site or during the site visit. Edited versions of these records are presented in the Gazetteer (section 6 of this report).

Attempts were made to follow up on various potential documentary sources relating to the airfield. In the event, as was the case with the initial assessment, most of these searches proved unfruitful and little additional information was identified. Wider research into the history of the Polish community in Britain, and the politics, administrative details, and activities of the Polish Armed Forces Resettlement Corps and the Official Committee for Polish Forces and Civilian Refugees, were beyond the practical scope of this report. Consequently, documents relating to these subjects, held in the Public Records Office at Kew, were not consulted as part of this research.

Two useful plans of the airfield were supplied by DERA (Brecon). Both show the airfield buildings numbered. One (WA9/287/58) is an Air Ministry plan dated to 1958. The other (DRG No. RAE/Ab 1203 B) is a plan drawn in 1955, and amended between 1960 and 1972. The numbered buildings refer to a schedule of buildings (DRG No. WA9/288/58) which has not as yet been located. Other drawings (numbered C:DWGS\2460-86) were referred to in the LUAU report. Although apparently in existence somewhere, these were not located during this project. Other cartographic evidence was obtained from Ordnance Survey maps, one dated 1948, the other 1977.

5.0 RESULTS

As a consequence of the dearth of additional resources that could be located during this project, the results of the survey are limited primarily to producing a record of the demolished airfield buildings based on the photographic record and observed structural details. The development of, and alterations to the buildings is based on analysis of differences between cartographic representations of the site, and on observed differences in building fabric.

5.1 The pre-airfield landscape

During the medieval period, the Ceredigion landscape was characterised by a pattern of dispersed farm settlements and hamlets, each surrounded by enclosed field systems.

Between these settlements was unenclosed common land used grazing livestock (Parkinson 1985, 118). As population densities increased, more and more land was enclosed.

The earliest cartographic evidence for the landscape around Aberporth Airfield is from the 1839 tithe map, by which time most of the open land between settlements had been enclosed. The only recorded settlement within the airfield itself is Pen y cnwc cottage. This is represented on the tithe map but was abandoned by the time the 1st edition Ordnance Survey map was published in 1887.

5.2 History and development of the airfield

The area of Aberporth Airfield occupies land that was under the ownership of several estates when the airfield was planned at the start of the 2nd World War. Vacant possession of the land was given to the Air Ministry on 29th September 1939 and the freehold was purchased between 1939 and 1941. The conveyance deeds are dated 1942. The airfield opened in 1940 as an anti aircraft co-operation base for the gunnery ranges in Cardigan Bay and later in the war it was used for aircrew training. The airfield forms part of a 'stop line', defending against possible invasion from the coast.

Aberporth Airfield consisted of an open expanse of grassland. The perimeter of the original site was defended by a series of 14 intervisible pillboxes (see Figure 1). These are of various designs, including probable examples of Types 22, 24, and 27. Two of the pillboxes appear to lie beyond the perimeter of the airfield, to the east and west of the site.

Four structures on the periphery of the site, but represented on the 1948 map, are of unknown function. PRNs 50928 and 50929 are the surviving foundations of demolished buildings in the south-west corner of the site. PRN 50930 is another demolished structure of unknown function on the north-east perimeter. PRN 50936 is a structure of unknown function located within a compound to the west of the B4333, south-west of the main building compound PRN 30594. This is shown as being accessed by tarmac driveways from the B4333.

The perimeter of the airfield as represented on the 1977 OS map, is little altered from the 1948 map, except for the encroachment of agricultural fields on the north and south edges of the airfield, which have effectively isolated pillboxes PRNs 50931 and 50933 from the rest of the site.

The present main runway was constructed in 1956, with a tarmac runway running approximately east-west across the middle of the site. There is also an emergency grass strip, on a north-east to south-west diagonal to the north of the main runway. The corners of the grass runway were marked by L-shaped strips of concrete. The number and position of runways in use before 1956 is not known.

The complex of airfield buildings was located on the western edge of the site. The main complex (PRN 30594) is on the east side of the B4333. On the west side of the B4333 was a smaller compound (PRN30592) containing similar buildings to those of the main site. This compound was formerly used by the Royal Navy (information supplied to LUAU by Amey Comax; DERA drawing C:DWGS\2460-86).

5.3 The original airfield buildings

The Ordnance Survey map of 1948, suggests that most of the buildings on the main site (PRN 30594) were originally constructed at the start of the airfield by 1940-41. The layout of the airfield buildings at this time is represented in Figure 3. Although the buildings are represented in simplified style, often incorporating several buildings within one building footprint, it is apparent that they are the same buildings that are represented on the later map of 1977. On balance it seems most likely that most of the differences between the maps are a result of lack of detail in the earlier map rather than suggesting that buildings have been rebuilt or significantly altered over time.

Some buildings are however, obviously not represented on the 1948 map, or are sufficiently different in form to suggest that some changes have occurred. It is only through observation of differences in style or construction on the ground, that the presence, absence or appearance of these buildings can be attributed to different constructional phases of the airfield.

Likewise, with the smaller compound (PRN 30592), although mostly similar, there are significant differences between the two map depictions.

The only clues to the original functions of the buildings that was obtainable during this project was from the site visit, and from a partially annotated plan of the site, observed during the site visit. Some of the buildings had signs indicating their functions, although it is not clear whether these were their original functions. The majority of the buildings were numbered, apparently an original feature. This numbering sequence is represented on several plans of the site, although there are some numbers missing from the sequence (see Figures 4 and 6), these may have been allotted to buildings that have been demolished in the past, or are located elsewhere.

Several buildings had names, these appear to be original, and all appear to have been barrack blocks. Some of these barracks have two names. It is not clear whether this represents two different 'phases' of occupation. The names in compound PRN 30592 include naval explorers, possibly reflecting the use of the compound by the Royal Navy, but also (apparently) famous mountaineers and inventors. The main compound includes the names of people associated with the RAF, but also with scientists and technological innovators, especially in the field of communications. Descriptions of each building and their possible functions are presented in the Gazetteer (Section 6).

Figures 3, 4 and 5 show the airfield buildings as they are represented on the maps of 1948, 1958 and 1977. PRNs for each building are indicated in Figure 5. Building footprints in Figure 3 (represented in pink), include the PRNs of all the buildings thought to be included within the building blocks depicted.

Buildings represented in grey in figure 5, are all of similar construction style and materials (see gazetteer) and are part of the original airfield complex. Some of these buildings are not however represented on the 1948 map, including PRNs 50899, 50894

Buildings represented in blue are those that had been demolished before the present demolition of the entire complex, so details of their construction are unknown. Most of these buildings are represented on the 1948 map in some form, and were therefore part of the original complex. Possible exceptions are PRNs 50884, 50883, 50882, 50917, 50905, and 50874.

Buildings represented in red are clad in corrugated iron. This suggests they may be of a different phase of construction. This is however, not certain since corrugated iron building PRN 50872 appears to be represented on the 1948 map, while PRNs 50885 and 50886 are not. PRNs 50903, 50869 and 50868, are possibly represented on the 1948 map as part of blocks incorporating several buildings, but may not be.

Features represented in yellow are air raid shelters. These are not represented on the 1948 map (with the possible exception of PRN 50943), but may never-the-less have been part of the original complex.

5.4 Additions and alterations to the buildings

The previous section suggests that the majority of the airfield buildings were built at the same time (or shortly thereafter). Some alterations to the complex are however, still apparent.

In compound PRN 30592, the only apparent modification is a flat roofed corridor linking together PRNs 50915, 50914 and 50910. In the main compound (PRN 30594), a similar flat roofed corridor appears to have been constructed, linking PRNs 50887, 50881, 50888 and 50880. The purpose of thee modifications is not known.

Considering the difference in the footprints of PRN 50876 as represented on the two plans, it seems likely that this building was considerably altered. At the time of the site visit however, this building was in mid demolition, so its structural details could not be assessed. It was also not included in the photographic record of the site.

Several alterations have been made at the north end of the site. Building PRNs 50907, 50902 and 50901appear to have been represented as one block in the 1948 plan. The eastern edge of the block is however, sufficiently different to suggest that there may have been another building to the east of PRN 50901 in the area that is now occupied by the tennis courts (PRN 50944). PRN50903 is a corrugated iron clad building,

suggesting it is of later construction. The latest phase of construction is represented by B45, a red brick extension to the NAFFI (PRN50907), this is presumed to have been constructed in the 1970s. The group of houses was built along the northern edge of the site may also have been built at this time.

The area between PRN 50901 and 50870 is represented on the 1948 plan as an open area with a cluster of three small buildings to the south. Due to discrepancies between the plans, the identity of these buildings is uncertain. By 1977 PRN 50884 had been constructed, along with the tennis courts and several other small buildings of unknown function. Later, all these buildings were demolished and the footings of PRN50884 were used as a car park. PRN50945 also seems to have been demolished and used as a car park.

Building PRN50918, at the east of the site, is of wooden panel construction and appears to be more recent origin although it is represented on the 1977 plan. Various other small modifications to the tarmac access ways have also been made.

5.5 The Polish resettlement camp

After the Second World War Aberporth Airfield was used as a camp for Polish refugees, prior to their repatriation. It is assumed that both parts of the airfield buildings were used. As well as using the buildings at Aberporth Airfield, there was a second camp to the south of the A487, at grid reference SN2440048800. Apart from the presence of the camps being indicated on the 1948 Ordnance Survey map, no documentary evidence relating to this phase of the airfield has been identified. It is not known when the resettlement camp closed and military use recommenced, but it is assumed to have been soon after 1948. Subsequent use of the airfield buildings appears to have removed any evidence of their use as a resettlement camp. Evidence of possible relevance to further researching the resettlement camp may be contained within Treasury Document Bundle T236 which is held at the Public Records Office at Kew. This collection contains material relating to the Polish Armed Forces Resettlement Corps and the Official Committee for Polish Forces and Civilian Refugees.

5.6 Later uses of the airfield

At some time after its use as a resettlement camp, Aberporth Airfield was re-occupied by the Air Ministry. An annotated plan supplied by DERA, suggests this may have happened in 1958. The site was used as a support site with training and workshop facilities for the main missile testing and defence equipment testing range at Aberporth, 1.5km north of the airfield.

Military activities at the airfield ceased in the mid 1990s, but it continued to be used by the 636 Volunteer Gliding School and by DERA for transport and trials. The site remains in the ownership of the MOD.

There is evidence around the site in the form of signs and notices, that some buildings have more recently been used by the YMCA and as a Youth Training Centre.

6.0 GAZETTEER OF SITES

The Gazetteer entries presented here are edited versions of computerised database records (PRN 50862) held within the regional Sites and Monuments Record (SMR) held at the Cambria Archaeology Offices in Llandeilo. 

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Plan of Aberporth Airfield in 1948 showing locations and PRNs of associated outlying structures Figure 1:




Figure 2: Plan of Aberporth Airfield circa 1977 before demolition of buildings






Figure 3: Plan of Aberporth Airfield buildings as represented on OS map of 1948

Figure 5: Plan of Aberporth Airfield showing buildings before demolition




Figure 6: Building numbers represented on combined Air Ministry plans








Photo 11: PRNs 50895 and 50892 from south-west


