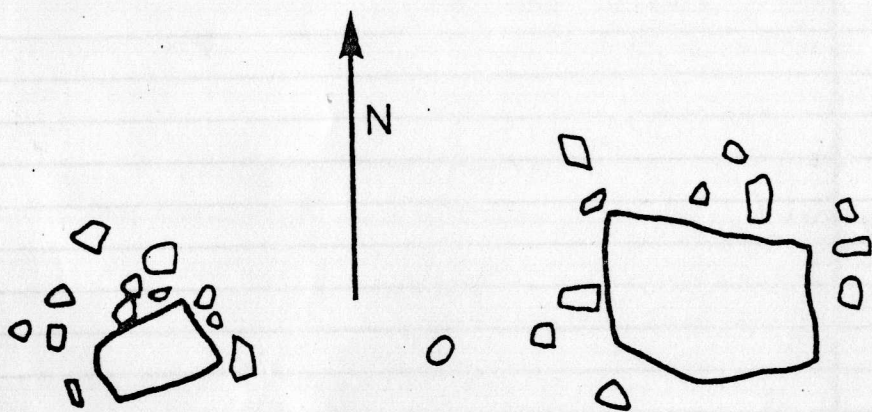

Standing Stones 1014

These two stones are locally called STONES OF THE SONS OF ARTHUR. It is very evident from the various memorials that at one or more periods, this district has witnessed stirring scenes which the ubiquitous Arthurian legend is introduced to explain. In the story of Kilhwch and Olwen or the Twrch Trwyth, is the following passage "They went from Glyn Nyver and came to Cwm Kerwyn: and there Twrch Trwyth made a stand and slew four of Arthur's champions, Gwartheygyd the son of Kaw, and Tarawc of Allt Clwyd, and Rheidwn son of Eli Atver, and Iscovan Hael, and after he had slain these men he made a second stand in the same place, and there he slew Gwydre son of Arthur, and Garselit Wyddel, and Glew son of Ysgawd, and Iscawyn son of Panon, and there he himself was wounded."
