The name "Llanvinnin Place Mission Chapel" must, therefore, be a more recent dedication - although it has now passed from present-day usage. It is now used as a furniture store.

ST. PETER'S SCHOOL-CHURCH.

The ceremony of laying the foundation-stone of this building was performed on the 29th of June (St. Peter's day), 1869, by Mrs. William Morris, in the presence of a large assemblage of persons who had marched in procession from Guildhall-square to the grounds. A sealed bottle, containing a printed document recording the event, gold and silver coins of the last issue, and a copy of recent local periodical publications, was placed in a hollow hewn in the stone. The building was opened on the 29th of June, 1870, when sermons were preached by the Ven. Archdeacon Archard Williams, the Rev. E. Evans, Llan-geitho, and the Rev. D. Howell, Cardiff.

ST. DAVID'S CHURCH.

Situate on an eminence at the west end of the town, was built to meet the wants of the Welsh population. The foundation-stone was laid by Bishop Jenkinson, May 27, 1835, and the church was opened January 19, 1837. It was consecrated by Bishop Thirlwall, February 3, 1841, when his lordship preached from Psalm cxxxviii. 2. A
