

"The fish and butter markets occupy the site of the old cross at the junction of the leading thoroughfares."

S. Lewis 1833

After standing for 63 years the "Cross" was demolished in July 1846 & its materials were sold by auction on 27th of that month."

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The "Cross" referred to was in fact the market building which was built on the site of the market cross (PRN 67) in 1783. See Lewis + RCAHM

ie. market cross PRN 67
The cross was removed in 1783, and on its site a small roofed market-place capped with a dome or turret was erected on twelve pillars

RCAHM

"This year the old cross was taken down, & a new Market House built upon 12 piles in the room: June & July, 1783. The conduit & lamp faced King St. the stocks faced lower Mkt St. & Guild Hall square; the fish slab faced Bridge St. General Nott's statue now occupies the site."
