A veritable cliff castle. These are not so plentiful on our northern coasts in Pembrokeshire. Fenton (538) compares it with the Trwyn-y-Badau camp on Pencaer, under the stone camp of Carn Fawr, while George Owen, who calls it Castle Tregriffith, sees a resemblance to Tintagel. It has been much eroded, and appeared to us a very ordinary camp of the cliff castle type. Fenton states, p.538, that a Warren of Trewern rode his horse over the crevasse between the camp and the main land. Someone is reported to have ridden over the Huntsman's Leap at Stackpole, and there is a cleft in the rocks at St. Brides which is known by the same name.
