

"At the foot of the hill [ie loygan] there were numerous large boulders arranged in some cases in circles; in one case there was an indication of a cromlech"

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At least two "circles" were observed in an area strewn with large boulders and overgrown with trees on the south-west slope of Ceygan rock. This is probably the area marked on the OS map(1). The "circles" are first off the track to the north side (ie upslope) and the one further in to the woodland is the best preserved (see GP's). They measure about 10m (?) in diameter and are more clearings in the boulder strewn area than anything else. Only one sketch, the south quadrant of the one further in, looks deliberately formed. ~~Perhaps there~~

NB Best observed in winter as undergrowth obscured even further.

It should be noted that Mr Morse of Honeycose pointed these out to Geoffrey Wainwright who dismissed them as being natural features.
