

"The old ruin by the turning to Gosport, which I have described as a Mariner's Chapel in Romish times for votive offerings, was, in the remembrance of elderly people now living, held by the Calvinistic Methodists, who performed Divine Service in it. From that chapel they removed to the one they now possess big Island House, in Wogan Street" ie PRN 21547

"There is an old roofless building at the turning to Gosport which is always washed by the sea at spring tide. The walls have the appearance of great age, built with the stones of the country, it was called anciently, "The Mariner's Chapel": I am told that some years ago it had a stoup and a piscina; no trace of them now. They say the interior had a very ancient appearance, and was very simple in its style of architecture. Some thirty years ago or more it was finally abandoned." It belonged to Calv-Meth' c. 1745-1796
