

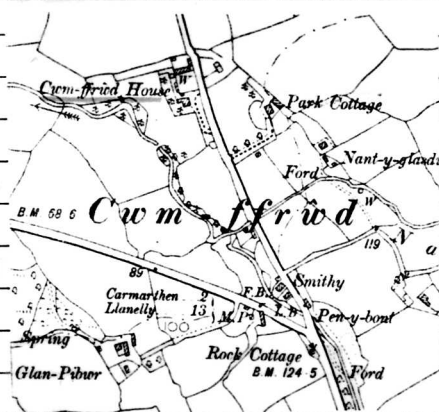
Built c. 1860 by Bishop Thirdwall or a relative of his opposite Parc yr Onnen

There was a coach-house and a chapel above the stable. A description of the chapel from someone brought up there is as follows:

'There was a bellcote. Two windows were leaded, and had pale green and brown glass, and another had brighter colours. Dividing the body of the chapel was a screen, half stone and half wood. The latter was fashioned in Victorian Gothic Style. The chancel was one step higher than the rest. At the east end there was an unvarnished oblong where the altar stood. Underneath the whitewash on the ceiling there was sky blue paint spangled with gold paper stars. This chapel of ease was licensed for Divine Service, and it was here the local Churchmen met before St Anne's was built'
