In the farmyard may be seen stone linings of the bottom of graves.

In these the corpses were placed uncoffined. The surface of the grave yard having been carried away for top dressing the land, the stone lining is exposed. These stone lined graves are not uncommon in Pembrokeshire; they may be seen in the Brownslade tumulus, and in the farmyard at Hasguard. (See LITTLE ENGLAND). On a stone forming part of granary steps there is an inscribed cross. Near the stream is a large stone in which a basin has been excavated; some say this is the lower part of a quern, but it is rather more like a primitive stoup or font. The farmhouse is cruciform. Gynyr, father of Non, and grandfather of St. David, is said to give his name to the place.
