

Visited by Ly H Williams 10/5/1977

The chamber is at present sunk in a shallow pit. Otherwise it is as described by the OS (1) with a capstone resting on one fallen orthostat on the west & two upright on the east. These orthostats form a rectangular chamber now open at the north & south ends. No trace of other stones (2) of a barrow or of the prostrate monolith 7591(1) ~~7591(1)~~ were found.

The area is reclaimed dune & at the time of field obsv was under seeded grass, probably a hay crop.

Newton Burrows

Cromlech 3071, 7591

Known as Devil's Quoít. In a little hollow; one stone fallen; capstone 12 feet long by 9 feet broad and 2 feet thick; others about 6 feet by 4 feet; one fallen. They are of Old Red Sandstone, with quartz. About 50 yards to the west is a small stone, white and looking like quartz, level with the ground. It seems to have been levelled and scratched. This is the only stone in the neighbourhood of the cromlech. Fenton, 405. Arch. Camb. III, xi, 281; IV, x, 142.
