COMMENT **AUTHORITY** Tump 3294 ' Camrose 50 No. 1 This is a very large tump, probably the most extensive in the Countymost likely it was erected for military and not for sepulchral purposes. It has been cut into and walled up in order that a pathway might be made to the top, so that measurements of the original struc ture are impossible. We calculated that it was at least 30 feet high, with a diameter at the base of about 100. Giraldus in his Itinerary states that Archbishop Baldwin, in the year 1188, passed through Camros on his road to St. David's from Haverfordwest, and mentions that, in the days when Stephen was King, the Fitzgeralds avenged the death of their relative Gerald, son of William, on the men of Roose. (See Rolls E , VI, pp. 99-100). It is not impossible that the occupants of a fortalice on this tump were the victims of this combat.
