The Church of St. Lawrence, with a nave and chancel, is on the top of a hill. It was restored in 1869, and is described in Arch. Camb. V, xiv, 46. The porch is on the south; the west window has been modernised; it seems to have been square-headed. There is an old square font, chamfered off, below. By the side of the altar is an early 18th century slab to the Lloyds of Thorn. At the west is an interesting bell-cote, which is crenellated. It is divided for two bells; only one is in position; it is supported by three sets of treble corbels. There are two openings on the west, and one on each of the other sides. These openings are built of long stones with short ones above. The result is extremely effective, somewhat resembling Saxon work. The old name of the place was JORBADESTON.
