Has neither steeple or bell-cote. Has two pulpits and two reading desks, one of each on either side of chancel arch. The mutilated effigy of a knight clad completely in mail which for generations lay out in the churchyard, has now been placed in the church. It is believed to be the oldest effigy in the County of Pembroke. Fenton, 248, 428. Arch. Camb. IV, xi, 339; IV, xii, 244.

The effigies in this disused chapel are interesting. A knight, armed partly in mail, partly plate (end of 14th century) and a lady "in close-fitting habit with tight sleeves, over which is a sleeveless gown, so cut as to disclose a light habit underneath; there is a mantle across the shoulders, a golden (probably) caul confines the hair; two cushions support the head, guarded by two figures new mutilated. The figure dates from 1380 to 1420". In this chapel is the stone hand. This little object projects from the wall, and was in all probability used as a taper holder; it is believed to be unique. On the base of the front are some lines, which the late Mr. Barnwell considered might be mutilated Ogams. Fenton, 247. Arch. Camb. IV, xi, 339; IV, xi, 295 (illustrated).
