Opened by Mr. Dearden in 1857. He found "human bones under a large flag; a fragment of a ring-shaped ornament, supposed to be made of ivory (more likely bone - E.L.); a flint arrowhead; and a broken earthenware vessel very rudely made and slightly ornamented with lines". The tumulus is now quite small and very dilapidated. It forms part of the fence to the highway. It stands on a natural plateau. From it Pembroke Castle is visible, but not Carew Castle. Arch. Camb. II, ii, 292.

Excavations yielded an interment bereath a large flag stone with a flut arrowhead broken earthenware
