On the exterior east wall of the chancel is an ancient incised cross. One of the most striking features of the church is a small tower, on which a larger has been built. On the south of the chancel is a good Norman pillar, and the font is of the same period. The chapel to the south of the church is named after St. Hugh, and the recumbent effigy of a priest therein is popularly supposed to represent this saint, after whom the great pool in the river is also called.
