St. Issell's

Apparently a comparatively late church, perhaps of Tudor date. A very handsome tower with stair turret. The tower is lighted near the top by four rather flat double-lancet lights; a Tudor double light near the bottom to the west. In order to accommodate the building to the ground, a flight of steps gives entrance to the body of the church from the west door, under the tower. There are two colonnades that to the south a restoration. The pointed arches are supported on octagonal pillars; that giving light to the chancel is a very flat late arch. The font appears old - a square oolite basin with somewhat archaic scroll decorations on a still older limestone base. Observe the transposed head on the south-east angle. The steps of the church yard cross remain on the northern side of the building.
