

Basically a straightforward Standing Stone. This site has been confused by (19th antiquarians).

The stone, now at Cilgwyn, bears an inscription giving the details of its moving* (1825). There are also reports of an inscription on the stone concerning St Paul & Owen Hangoch's sister (separated from each other by c. 1500 years) but this seems to have little or any ~~the~~ evidence to support it - probably an out & out hoax & even if it does exist, a modern ^{PRN} forgery.

Vicar of Hlangadog, enquiring in 1879, makes mention of "some gold ornaments found under it ... were sent to the British Museum"

Major Pearson (Owner of Cilgwyn by now?)

This must be treated as Fantasy - the Carmarthen Journal reported the moving of the stone in some detail 5 weeks after the occurrence, & makes no mention of that most surely would have been a newsworthy find.

Lewis (Topog. Dict. Wales 2, 1833) reports "some interesting remains ... British & Saxon ... Pentwyn ... by the late John Josiah Holford" - PRN 288: This may be something to do with the "gold ornaments"?
