AUTHORITY

The original name of this place was PEN ALUN. See Book of Llan Day, 254. Compare Caer Alun, which has been identified with Haverfordwest (?) and perhaps ALUN, the river at St. David's. For description of the church see Arch. Camb. II, i, 74; II, ii, 81, 314, 340; Little England, 379, 380, 389; Mason's Guide to Tenby, 7th edition, 54. The registers date from 1738. The stones at Penally are:

No. 4, Fragment of Cross Shaft inscribed in minuscules HAEC EST CRUX - QUAM EDIFICAVIT MAIL DOMNAS, Lap. Wall. plate 56, Figs. 7, 8, 9. This fragment was found with No. 3 forming the jambs of the fireplace in the vestry (see Albert Way in Archaeological Journal, vol. I, page 384). It was exhibited at the meeting of the C.A.A. at Tenby, 1851 (see Catalogue of Temporary Museum, Arch. Camb. II, ii, 340) after which it disappeared (J.R. Allen)
