Under the arch of this bridge Sir Rhys ap Thomas is said to have crouched, so that he might fulfil his promise, "that no invader should approach excepting he passed over his (Sir Rhys') belly". Henry of Richmond rode over the bridge, and so eased the conscience of Sir Rhys. (Fenton, 172) The bridge is figured in Nooks and Corners of Pembrokeshire, page 120, but appears as a one-arched bridge which is not the case, for there are two arches; the smaller one, nearest to Dale, is askew, the other and by are the largest, an ordinary arch. The story of Sir Rhys is told in the Cambrian Register, vol. I, page 86.
