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In the outer agger of this cliff castle Fenton fancied he found a tumulus. In the year 1880 Colonel Lambton and the Editor opened this tump, but found no signs of burial. Apparently the mound was a detached and unfinished portion of earthworks. Fenton calls this promontory "The Head of Man", a name now forgotten. Fenton, 410.

✓ This fort is undergoing considerable erosion. Much of the soil in what remains of the fort's interior is being eroded by sea spray. In addition the fort lies in a impact area of the military firing range. There are many impact craters in the fort; the ramparts in particular are suffering severely from this form of degradation.

Beneath the outer defensive bank on the west side a clear buried soil can be seen where erosion has cut a good section through the defenses.
