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Distinguished at a very early period as the place where a memorable convocation of the fathers of the Christian Church was held, for the suppression of the Pelagian heresy, which early in the sixth century was spreading rapidly through the principality.

It is a spacious and venerable structure, in the early style of English architecture, with a massive square tower, and was originally cruciform, but the north transept has been for many years a ruin, and the whole edifice has suffered materially from dilapidation.
