Orielton

The old home of the Owens

Built presumably by the Oriels, a family still existing in Pembs. but not among the land-owning class. In 1188, when Giraldus Cambrensis made his itinerary, Stephen Wiriet was apparently at Orielton. Giraldus says his house was haunted by unclean spirits. The Wiriets maintained possession until 1583 (circa) when Sir Hugh Owen, Knight of Bodorgan, Anglesey, married Elizabeth heiress of the Wyriotts, or Wirets. Their direct descendants remained at Orielton until the death of Sir Hugh Owen, Bart. August 8th, 1809. He having no issue left the property to his cousin John, son of Joseph Lord and Corbetta, daughter of Lieut. Gen. John Owen. The new proprietor of Orielton assumed the name of Owen, and was created a Baronet. He built the modern house. Becoming involved, the property was eventually sold.
