Grant all set to restore church's former glory

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
ST DAVID'S Church in Prendergast is to benefit from a £10,000 grant to fund urgent repair work to its medieval tower.

The National Churches Trust grant will pay for strengthening and repair work to the fragile tower, and help bring the Grade II-listed building back to its former glory.

The church's central newel and stone enclosure will also be reinforced, and repairs to the roof timbers, ceiling and the north wall of the nave - which have been damaged by damp will also take place.

Mark Edwards, county councillor for the Prendergast ward, said the announcement was "fantastic news" as the church was a focal point for the area.

The tower dates back to the late medieval period,

although the rest of the church was rebuilt between 1866 and 1868, mostly of squared rubble stone with slate roofs.

It has a fine Victorian interior with 19th and 20thcentury stained-glass windows and 18th-century and later wall monuments.

The grant is part of a £645,000 rescue package for 45 of the UK's most historic community minded churches.

Huw Edwards, broadcaster and journalist and vice-president of the Trust, said: "Churches are some of the most beautiful buildings in the country and these grants will help to bring more of them back to their full glory.'
