Builders set to start £16m Welsh halls renovation

WORK to transform an historic Welsh-medium halls of residence will begin on Monday after Aberyst-wyth University appointed its main contractors.

The university appointed construction company Morgan Sindall to refurbish Neuadd Pantycelyn, in an "ambitious project" that "will offer high-quality, contemporary, ensuite accommodation for up to 200 etudente" students".

students".

Work on the project, set to cost £16.5m will begin on Monday, 3 June, with the first students moving into the refurbished building in September 2020, after initial plans to have the building opened by September 2019 were set back through several delays.

Originally opened in 1951, the Grade II listed building will also provide offices for Aberystwyth's Welsh students' union UMCA, a refectory and attractive social spaces for use by students, staff and the local community.

Prof Elizabeth Treasure, vice-chan-cellor at Aberystwyth University said: "We are delighted to be work-ing with Morgan Sindall on the re-development of Pantycelyn, and to bring to life once more a hall that has been the focus for the Welsh cul-ture at Aberystwyth University for almost half a century.
