



The ring herein named was sent
to me by Miss "Lynard" and also
daughter of my Aunt Dr. Lynard
after her mother's death.

Given to you by my father, J. G. Lloyd,
Dec. 17, 1893. E. Wm. Eleanor Wynn.

This ring my mother wore constantly until
my brother William came from India,
he took a fancy to it & said he would
wear it & he did until his death. I
removed it from my mother's left hand
little finger after his death, at my
mother's desire I replaced it upon her
finger. ~~Thinking~~ I often reminded
my mother that the ring was mine
& that I hoped someday or other when
she should cease or not care to wear
it, that it would revert to me & she
acquiesced. It is now however (March
1892) in my sister Rosamund's possession
by the desire of my father (it having been
on my mother's finger when she died) but
he doubtless does not remember its history
or else it could be returned to me. H. P. Lloyd

Found on Friday March 13th
1835 at the spot marked x in the
adjoining sketch. 3 feet under the
surface among some stumps of large
box trees (long since sawn down &
removed) & covered with earth, in
making a new stone drain diagonally
across the Gran at Danyrallet,
a plain gold ring with motto
inside there. I give it thee, to think
on me.  (The Gold Thumb)

The ring was very pure, quite plain,
much battered & bent, so soft as to be easily
rounded again, of Lady's size. When
I gave it to my mother in 1835, she

History

Given to Griffin Lloyd at the death of his father, Iorwerth Dalglish Lloyd May, 1979

The Lloyd ring plus data arrived 22 Dec 1970 to Comox, British Columbia.

Given to me by my Father, Iorwerth Grey Lloyd on 18 December 1895, Eleanor Vigor

The ring herein named was given to me by Lina Layard, elder daughter of my Aunt R. Layard after her Mother's death. Iorwerth Grey Lloyd

This ring my Mother wore constantly until my brother William came from India. He took a fancy to it and said he would wear it and he did until his death. I removed it from my brother's left hand little finger after his death, at my Mother's and replaced it upon her finger. I often reminded my Mother that the ring was mine and that I hoped someday or other ----- she would cease or not care to wear it, that it would revert to me and she acquiesced. It is ----- however (now 1852) in my sister Rosamond's possession by the desire of my father (it being on my mother's finger when she died). He doubtless does not remember its ----- or ----- to ----- to me.

Found on Friday March 13th 1835 at the spot marked "x" in the adjoining sketch, 3 feet under the surface among some stumps of large box trees, (long since ----- and removed) and covered with earth, in making a new stone drain diagonally across the green at Danyrallt. A plain gold ring with motto inside there. I give it thee, to think on me. (The Gold Stamp) the ring was very pure, quite plain much battered and bent, so soft as to be easily rounded again, of Lady's size. Then I gave it to my mother in 1835. She now wears it.
