He was involved with Cadw's pan-Wales Deserted Rural Settlements Project for 7 years. He also undertook Tir Gofal field survey work and watching briefs. He has been an independent archaeologist since 2004 undertaking a variety of work including upland survey, desk-based appraisals/assessments, and watching briefs.

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#### 1. Summary

- 1.1 This historic environment appraisal has been undertaken by Trysor to examine likely impacts on the historic environment from a proposed wind turbine at Penysgwarn, Croesgoch, Pembrokeshire.
- 1.2 The appraisal has looked at all known historic assets within an area measuring 2km in radius, focused on a central point at the proposed turbine site at SM8481630520, consulting the regional Historic Environment Record and the National Monuments Record, as well as examining historic maps. A field visit was also undertaken to examine the location of the turbine and record previously unknown historic assets.
- 1.3 The appraisal area was revised after the field visit to exclude areas where there could be no intervisibility or impact on setting.
- 1.4 The appraisal shows that there is no evidence of buried archaeological features at the proposed development site.
- 1.5 No Scheduled Ancient Monument would be intervisible with the proposed turbine. The Listed Buildings within the revised appraisal area would not be significantly affected by the development.
- 1.6 The appraisal shows that no significant direct, physical impact or significant indirect, visual impact would be caused to the historic environment at the turbine site
- 1.7 On the basis of this appraisal, no archaeological mitigation is thought necessary for the proposed development.

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#### 3. Introduction

- 3.1 Martin Horne, of WinDS Ltd., Gwelfor, Castlemorris, Pembrokeshire, SA62 5XA has commissioned Trysor heritage consultants, on behalf of his client Mr Tom Evans, Penysgwarn, Croesgoch, Pembrokeshire, SA62 5JX, to write an Historic Environment Appraisal as part of documentation for a planning application for a single wind turbine at Penysgwarn.
- 3.2 Dyfed Archaeological Trust Heritage Management section supplied a generic brief for such appraisals (DAT HM, Undated). These appraisals are intended to be a rapid appraisal of the readily available historic environment information including a site visit. The purpose of the appraisal is to inform DAT HM as to whether any further assessment or evaluation would be required as part of the planning process. Trysor prepared a specification based on the brief (Trysor, 2013)



#### 4. The proposed development




Figure 1: Location of the proposed turbine, showing the 2km radius appraisal area.

- 4.1 It is proposed that a single, vertical axis, turbine with a total tower elevation of 29.9 metres will be located in a single field parcel at SM8481630520 at Penysgwarn, Croesgoch, Pembrokeshire, SA62 5JX, see Figure 1.
- 4.2 The turbine will require a foundation trench measuring 4 metres by 4 metres and 1.5 metres deep, with approximately a cable trench running for about 240 metres of trench to the west northwest. Existing farm trackways would be used to access the site.

#### 5. Methodology




Figure 2: Showing the area excluded from the appraisal area as there was no intervisibility between the areas.

- 5.1 A study area of 2km radius circle centred on SM8481630520 was chosen for the initial appraisal of sites. This area was revised to exclude areas on the western and northern sides of the appraisal area where there was no intervisibility or possibility of impact on setting of historic assets, see Figure 2.
- 5.2 The HER enquiry for the 2km radius area yielded 56 records.
- 5.3 Within the 56 records, 29 records lay within the excluded area and were removed from the dataset. This left 27 HER records in the appraisal dataset. There are two Scheduled Ancient Monument and 11 Listed Buildings.
- 5.4 A site visit was made to Penysgwarn Farm and the surrounding area on October 5th, 2013 to rapidly appraise if there were any visible archaeological features within the area directly affected by the turbine proposal and also the wider landscape context of the proposed development. The field was under pasture at the time.
- 5.5 The aerial photographs on Google Earth, dating to 2006 and 2009, were used to inform the appraisal.
- 5.6 Historic mapping was consulted. The maps used included 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> century 1:2500 scale Ordnance Survey mapping and the Llanrhian parish tithe map and accompanying tithe schedule (dated to 1844).
- 5.7 All information gathered during the desktop appraisal and fieldwork was entered into a bespoke database in Access 2003 format to create an appraisal dataset. The dataset is the source of the material output in this report, including the GIS mapping which illustrates the location of sites in the area, and the tables and appendices which provide detailed information on the sites within the study area.
- 5.8 At the end of a rapid appraisal of the data, the information from the site visit and historic map search, the appraisal dataset contained 30 records.
  - 5.8.1 The National Monuments Record was consulted and compared with the HER. No records were added from this source to the appraisal dataset.
  - 5.8.2 Three new records were created in the project database by Trysor. These were for the farmstead at Penysgwarn Farm (ID number 28) and two ploughed out field boundary banks (ID numbers 29 & 30).
- 5.9 Each of the records in the final appraisal dataset was assessed for Period, Rarity, Documentation, Group Value<sup>1</sup>, as well as Evidential Value, Historical Value, Aesthetic Value, Communal Value<sup>2</sup>. Once these had been considered the significance of each site was determined and scored in accordance with the categories adopted by the Welsh Archaeological Trusts i.e. Nationally Important, Regionally Important, Locally Important, Minor and Features Needing Further Investigation (Unknown), see Figure 2. Full details of this exercise are given in Appendix C.

5.10 As this exercise is an appraisal of the study area, not a full desk-based historic environment assessment, no site descriptions have been included in the appraisal dataset or this printed report, apart from newly recorded features (See Appendix B).




Figure 3: Significance of the sites recorded, labelled with the project ID number.



#### 6. Penysgwarn Farm: Historical overview

- 6.1 The farmstead is shown on the 1814 Fishguard sheet of Ordnance Survey Original Surveyors Drawing and the 1819 1" to 1 mile scale Ordnance Survey map





Figure 4: The fields around the proposed development site as shown on the 1844 Llanrhian parish tithe map.

- 6.2 The tithe survey of 1844 (see Figure 4) shows that the development site was part of Torbant Farm (named as *Torbont* on the 1814 Ordnance Survey map and on the tithe map). The farm was recorded as being owned by the Archdeacon Davies and occupied by Thomas Richards. The proposed turbine would stand virtually on the boundary between field parcels numbered as 1016 and 1017 on the tithe map. These fields were respectively named as *Werglo Fain* and *Parc y Berth* on the tithe schedule of 1842. Their boundaries had been levelled and ploughed over by the mid-1970s and they were amalgamated into a single, larger field.
- 6.3 It is not known when the field in question became a part of Penysgwarn Farm, which neighbours Torbant. *Pen-ys-gwarn* is shown in detail on the 1889 1:2500 Ordnance Survey map, the layout of the farm buildings depicted clearly for the first time. The farmhouse appears to be in the same position as it is today. Several outbuildings stood to the west, across the farmyard. Another building stood to the south side of the farmyard. Most of these buildings seem to be still in place today, with a group of much larger, modern agricultural sheds now standing to the west of the original farmstead core.
- 6.4 The field system shown around the farmhouse on 19<sup>th</sup> century maps, including the field in which the proposed turbine would stand has undergone significant changes during the past century. Many field boundaries have been removed, creating larger field parcels.

#### 7. Penysgwarn farm: Proposed turbine site

- 7.1 The proposed turbine at Penysgwarn Farm is to be located at SM8481630520 in an arable field, east of the farm buildings. The proposed cable trench will run for about 240 metres to the west northwest to an existing electricity pole. Existing farm trackways would be used to access the site.
- 7.2 When the farm and its environs were visited in October 2013, an assessment was made of the intervisibility of key monuments in the local landscape with the proposed turbine site. This assessment was undertaken on a dry day and in reasonable light.

#### 8. Impact Assessment

- 8.1 Within the revised area a total of 30 sites were recorded in the appraisal database.




Figure 5: Level of impact on the sites recorded, labelled with the project ID number.

- 8.2 The Direct and Indirect impact on each site was assessed taking into account both physical and non-physical impacts. Each impact was assessed within the scale Very Low, Low, Moderate, High and Very High, taken into account the significance of the site and the nature of the impact. A full table is found in Appendix A but a summary is tabulated in Table 1 below and illustrated in Figure 5.
- 8.3 As Table 1 and Appendix A show, no recorded historic assets within the area of the appraisal were determined to be exposed to any significant impact from the proposed turbine development. (Details of the appraisal for direct and indirect impact for each of the sites in Table 1 can be found in Appendix A).
- 8.4 An examination of the proposed development site identified no evidence of surface material of archaeological interest. The land was clear of crop with good exposure of the underlying soil surface.
- 8.5 An existing access track would be used and there will be no impact on any historic assets.
- 8.6 The cable trench would run west-northwest towards an electricity pole to the south of Torbant. It would not damage any standing boundary banks, but would cut through the line of a ploughed out boundary bank (ID number 29).

9. Historic Landscape Aspects Relating to the Penysgwarn Farm Proposed Turbine

9.1 The following aspects of the historic environment around the Penysgwarn Farm proposed turbine site have also been considered by this appraisal, as required by the brief supplied by the Dyfed Archaeological Trust Heritage Management Section (DAT, HM, Undated);

#### a) Scheduled Ancient Monuments in their settings

There are two Scheduled Ancient Monuments within the revised appraisal area. Treffynnon Chambered Tomb (ID number 1) lies over 1.9 kilometres to the south southeast of the proposed turbine location. It is thought unlikely that the two would be intervisible and there would be no effect on the setting of the chambered tomb. Mesur y Dorth Inscribed Stone (ID number 2) is 980 metres to the west northwest of the proposed turbine site nut would not be intervisible and there would be no impact on setting.

#### b) Previously Recorded Non-scheduled Historic Assets in their settings

A small number of historic assets in the revised appraisal area are thought likely to experience a Low or Very Low indirect, visual impact. This is due to their being intervisible with the proposed turbine over distance, but in no case would their setting affected by the development. These sites are shown in the following table;

#### c) Newly identified sites of historic importance

Three newly recorded historic assets were noted for this appraisal at or near the turbine site. They was the farmstead at Penysgwarn Farm (ID number 28), and two former field boundaries (ID numbers 29 & 30).

#### d) Listed Buildings in their settings

There are eleven Listed Buildings within the revised appraisal area. Six of these were buildings Trenewydd Fawr farmstead (ID 17, 18,19, 20, 21, 22). The top of the turbine blades may be visible from some of these buildings, but higher ground lies between the two and there would be no effect on their setting.


Castle Cenlas house (ID number 23) lies 1.8 kilometres away to the east. The proposed turbine may just be visible from the upper storeys of this house, but outbuildings and a plantation appear to largely block the view to the west. The turbine would have no impact on the setting of the house, which is surrounded by trees.

Loch Turffin house (ID number 24) and an outbuilding (ID number 25), 1.3 kilometres to the southeast, are largely sheltered from any view of the proposed turbine by surrounding trees, but views may be possible during the winter months when the foliage has been lost. The turbine would not impact on the setting of either building.

Nearly 1.7 kilometres to the south, two outbuildings at Tyllwyd (ID numbers 26 & 27) may just be intervisible with the turbine, but it would have no impact on their settings.

#### e) Non-statutory buildings of local importance

No non-statutory buildings of local importance included on a local list were identified as being affected by the proposed development.

#### f) Registered Parks & Gardens and their essential settings.

There are no Registered Parks and Gardens within the revised study area.

#### g) Registered Historic Landscapes

The development site does not lie in a Registered Historic Landscape.

#### h) Non-registered Historic Landscapes

There are no identified non-registered Historic Landscapes within the revised study area.

#### i) LANDMAP and landscape characterisation information

The proposed turbine would stand in the Mathry and Hayscastle LANDMAP Historic Landscape Aspect Area (PMBRKHL46060). This extensive aspect area covers much of northwest Pembrokeshire. It is characterised by regular and irregular fields, small to large in size, with little woodland on the exposed plateau itself, and towards the coast, but wooded valleys towards the east and south. Settlement is mainly dispersed, but there are a number of nucleations, many with medieval origins. All farm types and housing types are represented, including gentry houses. Modern roads, including the A40 and A487 trunk roads, cross the area. Historic assets from all periods are found within the Aspect Area, including medieval churches, medieval castles, Neolithic monuments, a stone circle, Bronze Age round barrows and Iron Age defended sites. The revised appraisal area has only one known prehistoric monument, no castles or defended enclosures, but it does have several dwellings that are Listed Buildings, which would not experience significant impact from the development. The proposed development would not impact on the essential character of the Aspect Area.

#### j) Conservation Area

There are no Conservation Areas within the revised study area.

#### k) Tir Gofal interests or requirements

No Tir Gofal interests were identified.

#### 1) Buried archaeological potential


There is no surface, map, aerial photographic or documentary evidence suggestive of significant buried archaeology at the proposed development site.

#### m) Palaeoenvironmental potential

No palaeoenvironmental potential can be identified at the Penysgwarn Farm turbine site. It is situated in an arable field which is well-drained.

#### n) Hedgerows and field patterns

The proposed development would be located in an arable field, which has lost some of its former divisions due to the amalgamation of field parcels during the 20<sup>th</sup> century. The proposed development will not change the character of the modern field system or have a significant effect on any field boundary banks.





#### o) Ancient woodland

No areas of Ancient and Semi-natural Woodland lie within the revised appraisal area.

#### p) Place-names

There are no significant place-names in close association with the proposed development site.

#### q) Cumulative impact

No turbines were visible from the proposed turbine location.

#### m) National Park

The proposed turbine location does lie close to the Pembrokeshire Coast National Park, which extends to the A487 road at Square and Compass, some 700 metres to the north. Higher ground to the north of the proposed turbine site would effectively block views of it from the National Park, however. As can be seen in Figure 2, those parts of the National Park which lie within a 2km radius of the site have been included in the excluded area as a result.

#### 10. Conclusion

- 10.1 There would not be a significant impact on the historic environment or on individual historic assets in relation to the proposed development of the proposed wind turbine at Penysgwarn Farm, Croesgoch, Pembrokeshire.
- 10.2 There is no evidence to indicate the presence of buried archaeology at the turbine site.
- 10.3 No known significant historic asset would be exposed to a direct physical impact. Two ploughed out field boundaries (ID numbers 29 & 30) would be exposed to a Low direct, physical impact.
- 10.4 Penysgwarn farmstead (ID number 28) would be exposed to Low, indirect, visual impact. 15 other historic assets would experience Very Low, indirect visual impact due to intervisibility with the proposed turbine over a distance but this would not affect their settings.
- 10.5 On the basis of this appraisal, no archaeological mitigation is thought necessary.

#### **Description:**

The farmstead at Penysgwarn is shown on the 1814 Fishguard sheet of Ordnance Survey Original Surveyors Drawing and the 1819 1" to 1 mile scale Ordnance Survey map. Pen-ys-gwarn is shown in detail on the 1889 1:2500 Ordnance Survey map, the layout of the farm buildings depicted clearly for the first time. The farmhouse appears to be in the same position as it is today. Several outbuildings stood to the west, across the farmyard. Another building stood to the south side of the farmyard. Most of these buildings seem to be still in place today, with a group of much larger, modern agricultural sheds now standing to the west of the original farmstead core.

The field system shown around the farmhouse on 19th century maps has undergone significant changes during the past century. Many field boundaries have been removed, creating larger field parcels and the farm itself has expanded, taking in fields from neighbouring Torbont/Torbant.

The census returns for 1841 show that a Dorothy Roberts, aged 60, was farming Penysgwarn. Her two sons Samuel (18) and Daniel (16) lived with her, as well as two female servants.

The 1851 census records that Dorothy Roberts still farmed Penysgwarn, which was 117 acres in extent. Two sons worked on the farm; William (45), a widower, and Samuel. To female general servants also worked at the farm.

By 1861, Dan Roberts (36) was farming here. He was a widower and lived with his five children, Martha (11), Dorothy (8), Mary (6), Margaret (4) and Ebenezer (2). He employed a female House Servant and a female Out Servant, as well as a Ploughman and a Carter on the farm, which now extended to 140 acres.

Dan Roberts was still at Penysgwarn in 1871, now farming 240 acres. He had remarried, and lived with his wife Ann (40). Three children are also recorded; John (23 - a sailor), Mary and William (3). A female general servant and two male farm servants were employed.

Dan Roberts was farming 150 acres at Penysgwarn in 1881. He now lived with his wife Anne, aged 57 and a native of Brawdy parish. Whether this is the same woman as the 40 year old Ann from Llanrheithan who was his wife in 1871 is debatable. He may well have remarried. Of his children, only his son William now lived here. He employed two male farm servants and two female domestic servants.

The family remained unchanged at the time of the 1891 census, with Daniel Roberts now employing three male and two female farm servants.

In 1901, we see that Daniel Roberts, now 78, was a widower, now living with his son William and daughter in law Mary, who had an 11 month old son, John Brian Roberts. Another of Daniel's grandsons was also present, John Gwynfrad Charles (23), originally from Roch. Two male workers and a dairy maid were employed at this time.

The most recent available census returns are those of 1911. This records that William Roberts as head of household, living with his wife Mary and no fewer than 9 children; John Brian (10), Martha Annie (9), Sidney Lloyd (8), Ivor James (7), William Percy (5), Ida



May (4), Gwendoline Maud (3), Rosaline Grace (2) and Howell Vincent (9 months). Two male and one female servant worked on the farm.

In 1919, there is a record of a sale at which Penysgwarn and a number of other properties were sold by the Trecvacoon Estate, which had been owned by the Harries family during the 19th century.
