## Introduction and historic background

The Dyfed Archaeological Trust (DAT) was consulted by Glastir contract manager Peter John on 12/02/2014 regarding fencing and installing a gate adjacent to 2 HEFs.

## Historic Environment Issues

**PRN 51807** This is the site of a small 2 cell building lying within a small enclosure adjacent to a former track way. The building is shown on both the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> edition OS maps. It is not named and is unclear whether it was a former cottage or agricultural building. It no longer shows on modern maps and aerial photographs (Next perspectives 2009) show the site obscured by trees as part of woodland belt, so the extent and nature of any survive ng remains is unclear.

The proposal is for a post and wire fence to be installed along the existing boundaries to create stock excluded woodland (opt 100). This is welcomed as it will protect any surviving ruins from stock damage.

**PRN 51813** This is the site of a cottage named as Pen Cnwc on the 1<sup>st</sup> and second edition OS map. It is depicted as two cell structure set in an enclosure. The outline of the building is shown on modern maps although aerial (Next perspectives 2009) show it obscured by trees and the absence of a clear access route suggests it is ruinous.

The proposed works are to install a gate on the existing fence boundary adjacent to the cottage footprint. This is acceptable to DAT as long the gate post is not attached to any standing walls as this may cause deterioration to masonry.
