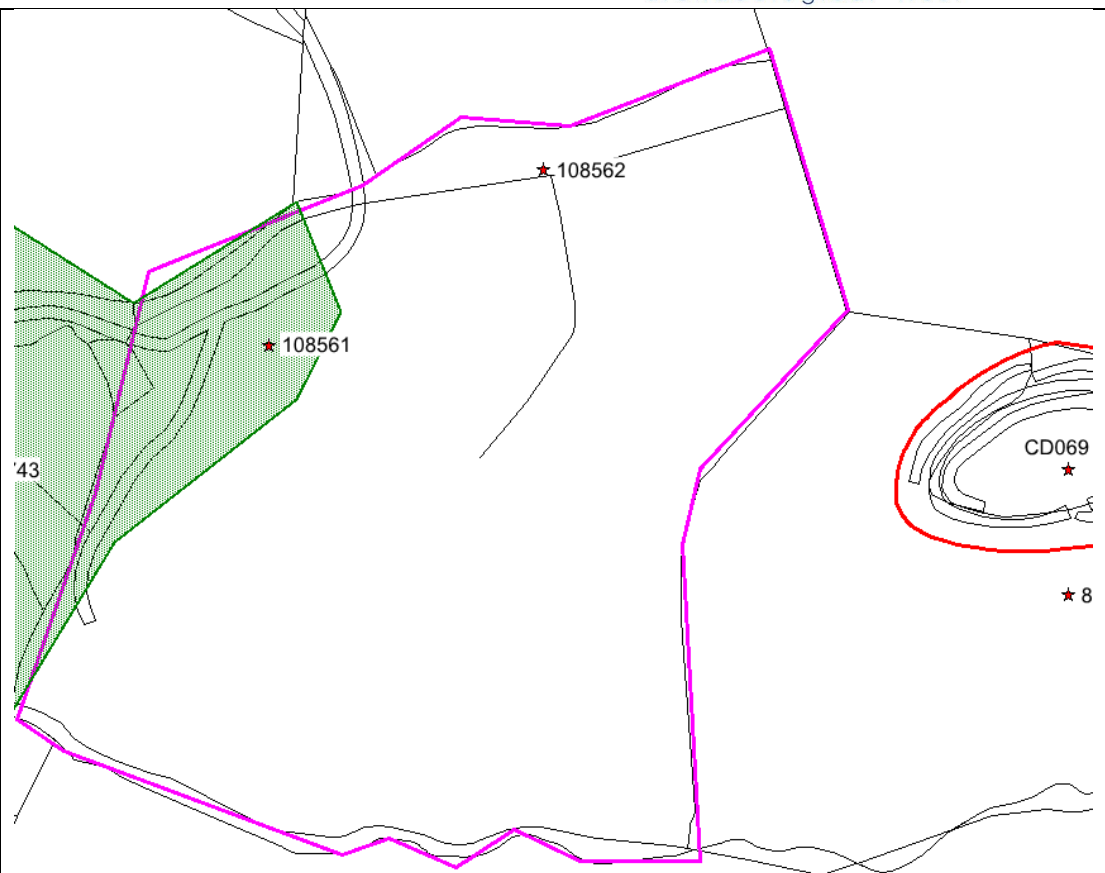

<b>Advice (If the proposal is considered to be inappropriate at this location please provide an explanation)</b>	<p>Parcel A (SN68698480)          Scheduled Monument CD 069 Pen y castell Iron Age Hillfort lies around 50 meters from the eastern edge of this consultation, therefore Cadw should be consulted regarding the setting of the monument.</p> <p>PRN 9635 Post Medieval Lechwedd Helyg Mine          Llechwedd Helyg Lead Mine is a small mine complex which shows signs of having had some disturbance of its spoil tips in recent years. However, the core of the mine, including the crushing mill and ore-processing area still have significant structural remains.</p> <p>PRN 108562 Post Medieval Boundary Bank          A denuded earthwork boundary bank with occasional rowan trees growing along its course. The bank is c.2 metres wide, with a parallel ditch c.1 metre wide along its eastern side. A trackway, which may be a later addition, follows the eastern side.</p> <p>No planting should take place on the area shaded in green.          Relic boundary banks should be marked out and a buffer of at least 5 metres eitherside left unplanted.</p> <p>HLCA 89 Coed Gruffydd – described as having a ‘highly wooded aspect’.</p>



Parcel B (SN69038523)

PRN 108580 Bronze Age Cairnfield

This cairnfield contains at least three small stone cairns and a larger round barrow. Further detailed examination of the immediate vicinity may identify more cairns, but some destoning of this area of former rough pasture may have led to the loss of some features.

PRN 108576 Bronze Age Cairn

A small funerary cairn, c.3 metres in diameter and less than 0.2 metres high, partly obscured by the stones of what appears to be a recent clearance cairn.

PRN 108577 Bronze Age Cairn

A small funerary cairn, 3m in diameter and less than 0.2 metres high. The stones of the cairn protrude through the grassy surface

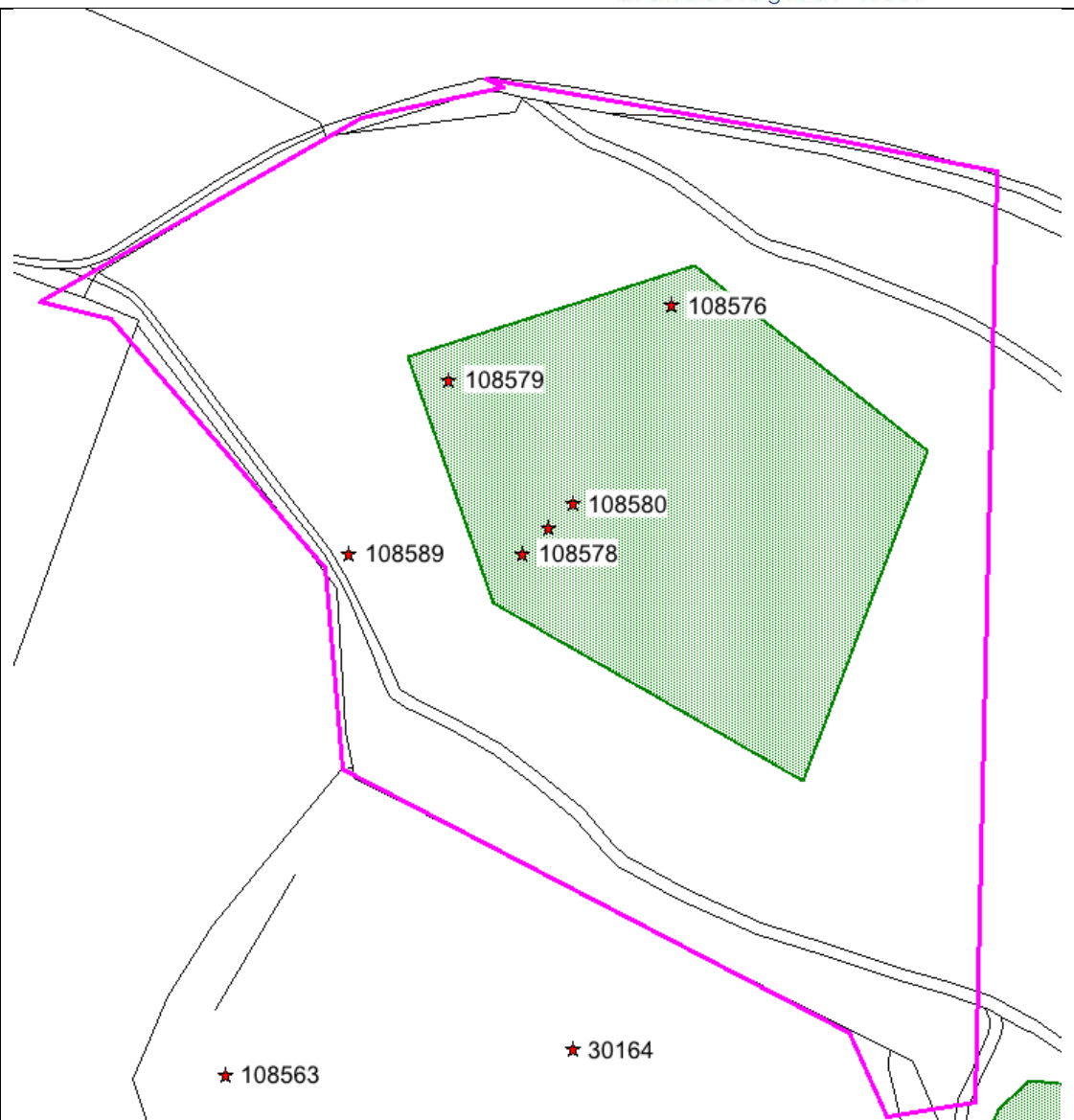
PRN 108578 Bronze Age Cairn

A small funerary cairn, c.3 metres in diameter and less than 0.2 metres high, partly obscured by the stones of what appears to be a recent clearance cairn.

PRN 108579 Bronze Age Round Barrow

A round barrow on a prominent hillock which affords excellent views in all directions and makes the barrow intervisible with others in the area. The

	<p>barrow has been partly robbed out, but is still an impressive monument. It appears to have been up to 13 metres in diameter originally, although now an oval mound measuring some 12 metres x 9 metres survives, still standing up to 1.5 metres high in places, with its centre quarried out and considerable piles of disturbed stone within and around the mound. Some large blocks alongside the monument may be derived from more recent field clearance activity. The relationship of the barrow with the nearby cairns suggests that it may have been the focus of a cairn cemetery. Other cairns may survive in the immediate vicinity, but were not noted during the Tir Gofal visit of 2002.</p> <p>PRN 108589 Post Medieval Quarry          A small, disused quarry. Presumably exploited for very localised use.</p> <p>No planting should take place within this parcel without an archaeological walkover survey to establish the likely extent of the cairnfield.</p> <p>HLCA 62 Banc Lletty Ifan Hen – formerly an unenclosed sheepwalk and described as, ‘a treeless landscape’ – therefore introducing a predominantly conifer plantation would be detrimental to the historic landscape character.</p>
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Parcel C (SN70128529)

PRN 9145 – Post Medieval Leat

A leat built by John Horridge in 1840 from Afon Leri to Cwmsebon Lead Mine. The section of this leat which crosses Lletty Ifan Hen farm has been largely lost due to the construction of a modern farm trackway on the northern slope of Banc y Garn and land improvements on the western side of the same hill. Several hundred metres of the leat course appear to have survived to the east of the point where the trackway diverges from the leat course at SN708851. RPS 2002

HLCA 20 Banc Llechwedd-ddu - described a historically unenclosed moorland which was formerly part of the Y Dywarchen grange of Strata Florida. – therefore introducing a predominantly conifer plantation would be detrimental to the historic landscape character.
