Thanks firstly for forwarding this proposal for tree planting near Wolfscastle. I have checked the map provided against the regional Historic Environment Record (HER) and other sources and note the following historic environment features which may be affected by the proposals:

DESCRIPTION

Aerial photographs show a crop-mark ditch representing the north and west sides of a rectangular defended enclosure at least 95m N-S and 60m E-W. The site lies on a gentle north-facing slope at 90m above sea level. On the ground a low, spread bank is apparent with a slight external ditch on the north side

of the E-W aligned bank. A low mound within the corner of the banks may be the remains of a round barrow. In 2006, the site was under improved pasture. K Murphy and R Ramsey 29 November 2006

DESCRIPTION


A field system of small rectangular fields showing as a cropmark on aerial photographs. This system is clearly related to the enclosure PRN 2386. K Murphy 2004.

Below is a map showing the location of the sites noted above; the red lines indicate archaeological features plotted from aerial photographs. The green polygons are Glastir management polygons which have been drawn to indicate areas of archaeological sensitivity. Based on the information we have available I would recommend not planting trees within those areas marked out with green. I note your plan this year is to plant a strip which runs along the western field boundary on a north-south orientation and think this shouldn't impact on the defended enclosure PRN 35778. You mention that this will become a publicly accessible space and I wonder if there are any opportunities to offer interpretation of the archaeology – both the scheduled remains and those which have been identified through aerial photos? I would also welcome the opportunity to discuss your further plans tree planting in the area.

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Dear Louise,

My colleague, Matt Pyart, suggested I speak to you about a tree planting project I'm developing near Wolfscastle. The land we have access to is highlighted in light blue on the map below and includes the SAM West Ford Camp (PE257). We have no desire to plant trees on or near the monument and would value your input to develop our plans. The scheme will take the fields out of agricultural production in favour of creating a publically accessible space including woodland and meadow. My idea would be that the monument would be managed as meadow with light grazing or an annual cut. My urgent need is to begin the tree planting aspect in the next month or so. The plan is to plant the part highlighted in dark blue at the north western edge to take advantage of some funding which is available whilst avoiding the monument, then develop a more considered plan for the rest of the area over the coming years.

My question to you therefore is twofold:

- Is there any reason from your perspective not to plant the initial tranche of trees in a strip to the north west of the monument imminently?
- Can we liaise to establish exactly the extent of any areas you would like to see managed in any particular way as the project moves forward? This bit will develop over the coming few years.



Happy to chat through this if you like, but the initial tree planting strip is urgent to catch the tree planting season and take advantage of funding in this financial year.
