

# FLA 239 21-22 Stackpole Estate near Bosherston

Thank you for your consultation. I have checked the map boundaries against the regional Historic Environment Record (HER) and other sources and note that the consultation area of Lawrenny Woods lies within the Essential Setting of the Registered Historic Parkland of Lawrenny PGW (Dy) 36 (PEM). We therefore recommend consulting Cadw.

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

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
