Plas Alltiran is a corner building at the junction between Llanmorrot and Turkey Shore Roads.
II Late C19 doctor's house and surgery of 2 storeys and attic on a corner site; built in the style of late C16 North Wales gentry houses, to the order of Miss Jane Henrietta Deane (1842-1926) for her medical practitioner, Dr. Russell. Rubble walls of local stone with darker stone quoins and dressings, cream ashlar corbels and darker ashlar coping to cross-stepped gables. Slate gabled roofs with blue clay ridges. Subtle, irregular plan and facades, each facade with differently placed gable. Chamfered hardwood mullioned

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windows, some with transoms, and all recently (1979) covered over.

In Turkey Shore Road, from east end, three slate steps to waiting room doorway with 4 panes wide mullioned overlight and blocked door; gabled projection with blocked mullioned waiting room window on ground floor and a blocked window to each of the upper floors, the top floor flanked each side by 3 corbelled tall rectangular stone stacks set diamondwise and crowned by small inset crow-stepped gable with high stringcourse and finial. The rest of this elevation set back, the third bay with blocked dispensary window on ground floor and blocked square window to left hand above, the 4th and 5th bays with a wide common attic window with a crowning crow-stepped gable with high stringcourse and finial; 3 slate steps to the house doorway in the 4th bay with 4 panes wide mullioned overlight.

7 sided narrow front corner elevation with 3 facets with hipped roofs on each flank, the central facet of each flank

with blocked opening above and below; the upper floors of the front facet are cantilevered on corbels and crowned by a crow-stepped gable.

A tall stone stack links front corner and side wing in Slanpaw Road, the last with a full-height crow-stepped gable of 2 bays width, the openings irregularly spaced and with top right hand window in the centre of the gable; left hand doorway.

Outshot to right hand with ruinous slate roof against east elevation of side wing which has tall, 4-flue cantilevered chimneystack with mullioned window set within it. The house is linked by stone rubble wall to Nos 1 and 2 Turkey Shore Road and Nos 1 and 2 Slanpaw Road, all of which form part of the same composition (see separate items). The wall extending to Nos 1 and 2 Slanpaw Road is interrupted by the gable end to a ruined dwelling.
